elcome to the August edition of *Hillingdon* People. You would have heard by now the very disappointing news from the High Court that our Judicial Review of the Mayor's decision to expand ULEZ to outer London has been lost with the judge ruling that there was no basis in law to intervene in the Mayor's decision. The strength of public opposition in outer London to ULEZ was made very clear with the recent surprise by-election result in Uxbridge. Even the Mayor's own supporters are saying it is the wrong time to be expanding this scheme and that it will hurt many thousands of low-income earners. vulnerable people, ordinary workers and small businesses who are the beating heart of our borough. I am proud that we had the courage and conviction to stand up for you, our residents and I would like to thank everyone who sent messages of support for our stand.

On a more positive note, I am delighted that a new Hillingdon Hospital is a step closer now that the government has confirmed funding for the rebuild as part of the £20 billion New Hospitals Programme. With planning permission already having been granted the project remains on track to be delivered by 2030.

That leads me on to another major investment project, this time our very own flagship regeneration scheme in Hayes. Work is now under way to deliver hundreds of new homes for residents at Avondale Drive and Hayes Town Centre estates. You can read more about this on pages 18 and 19.

As a council we are also committed to helping residents live healthy and active lives and we have recently invested in some of our outdoor leisure facilities. As you can see on pages 16 and 17, this has included renovating some of our tennis courts and creating two brand new cricket pitches.

Finally, with the new academic year just around the corner our Learn Hillingdon adult education courses for 2023/24 are now live and there are hundreds of subjects for you to choose from. Find out more on pages 24 to 25.

Green flags fly high across borough



The council has retained its status as one of the greenest boroughs in the country after receiving 67 Green Flag Awards – the most held by any local authority.

It is the eleventh year running the council has achieved the top spot for its green spaces through the national - and international - awards scheme which recognises and celebrates most beautiful and well-managed parks in the UK and beyond.

To be awarded a Green Flag, the council's parks and green spaces must meet stringent criteria that show they meet the highest standards for facilities, cleanliness and environmental friendliness, as well as being welcoming and community-orientated.

The annual Green Flag Áward scheme, judged by a group of environmental charities including Keep Britain Tidy, recognises accessible green spaces and is the national standard for public parks.

Last year, four new parks achieved the prestigious status bringing the council's total to a chart-topping 67, and for 2023 all of those green spaces have retained their awards.

Cllr Eddie Lavery, Cabinet Member for Residents' Services, said: "We're committed to making Hillingdon a green and sustainable borough, with green spaces that are welcoming to

residents, visitors and wildlife. "We're proud to have held the top title for number of green flags for more than a decade, but it's not a position we take lightly. Our success is the result of all the hard work and great management of our green spaces team and the many community and volunteer groups they work closely with to keep our borough parks and green spaces to the highest standards." New plants restore Eastcote flood alleviation scheme

The council's award-winning rain gardens in Eastcote, which help prevent localised flooding, were given a £12,000 makeover with hundreds of new plants this spring.

During the past few winters, the plants have been affected by the cold, with some dying off. Almost 1,000 new plants have now been restored to the

15 rain gardens following the work in May, with species including hebe (a favourite of bees), miscanthus, panicum, stipa, pennisetum and various grasses. The gardens were installed along Field End Road in summer 2019 using carefully chosen plants and shrubs that help to slow the natural flow of rainwater and prevent localised flooding.



Commemorative banner giveaway

The lamppost banners which adorned Hillingdon's town centres to mark the King's Coronation have been gifted to local people as a memento of the historic occasion.

In June, the council offered residents the chance to enter a draw to win one, and 617 people submitted requests online.

The lucky winners selected at random collected their own pieces of history from the Civic Centre, Uxbridge in early July.

Zara Curtis, from Uxbridge,

collected her banner with 10-month-old daughter Keira, and Keira's grandparents John and Jacci Curtis (pictured below).

She said: "It's going to go in our garden. We're right under the flight path so I hope that some people flying over will see it."





Refurbishment for Uxbridge Mortuary

Uxbridge Mortuary has been given a high-tech overhaul by the council following a two-year, £2.5 million refurbishment and extension scheme. It follows a review which found the Kingston Lane site needed vital roof repairs and significantly more space. Works included expanding the post-mortem area, which now includes a 'negative-pressure' room which helps contain or stop the spread of infection. Capacity on site has been doubled and variable temperature fridges give flexibility in the operation of the service. A new training area is also being developed for anatomical pathology technicians, who will be able to watch post-mortems via a

live camera feed. This will also be a



Following heavy rain, water is retained in the gardens, minimising the risk of flash flooding on highways and reducing the flow of water into the local sewerage system. Historically, surface water from heavy rain in this area would flood the road and flow into local shops.

Cllr Eddie Lavery, Cabinet Member for Residents' Services, said: "These urban drainage schemes enable us to protect the borough against extreme rainfall and are part of our commitment to creating a green and sustainable borough.

"Of course, as well as serving a practical purpose, they help keep the area looking pleasant with plants and shrubs that both people and wildlife can enjoy."

useful resource for the police when performing forensic post-mortems.

Further improvements were also made to the personal protective equipment (PPE) area and site office, including an improved CCTV security system and intruder alarms.

Cllr Jonathan Bianco, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Property, Highways and Transport, said: "This was a much-needed refurbishment to a vital facility, bringing it up to the very latest standards and futureproofing it for years to come.

"My thanks go to the team who continued their vital work throughout the construction and now get to perform their duties in a much-improved environment."



An Uxbridge mum has been ordered to pay almost £3,000 after fraudulently using a Blue Badge to get a parking space during the school run.

Following an investigation by the council's counter fraud team, Carly Kent, 43, of Chancel Close, was convicted of misusing a disabled person's badge during a hearing at Uxbridge Magistrates' Court on 20 June.

The court was told the defendant had indicated her guilty plea by submitting a form in the post.

The counter fraud team had been deployed to Uxbridge on 14 November 2022, after being alerted to suspected Blue Badge misuse during pick-up times at a local school by colleagues in the council's parking services team.

The team later discovered Kent using the Blue Badge to park on double-yellow lines, without the badge holder present, the court was told. The counter fraud team's investigation revealed the badge belonged to Kent's late mother, but it wasn't until she was interviewed under caution that Kent admitted displaying the badge.

Cllr Martin Goddard, Cabinet Member for Finance, said: "We're committed to ensuring vulnerable adults in Hillingdon can live active and independent lives.

"This is an appalling case. The misuse of Blue Badges is just not acceptable. It prevents our most vulnerable residents and visitors who have genuine needs from parking within easy access to the local businesses and services they rely on.

"We'll always do everything in our power to clampdown on fraudsters, take action and stamp out this selfish behaviour in our borough."

Kent was ordered to pay a fine of £440, a victim surcharge of ± 176 and the council's prosecution costs of £2,342.

A step closer for new Hillingdon Hospital

Plans for the new Hillingdon Hospital have reached another vital milestone after the government confirmed the project would continue to be funded as part of its £20 billion New Hospitals Programme.

This news comes after the council granted planning permission for the scheme in January.

Leader of the Council, Cllr Ian **Edwards,** said: "I am delighted that the new Hillingdon Hospital has been approved and will be fully funded.

"This is another significant milestone for the project, following on from securing planning permission earlier this year. Progress will now ramp up.

"This is further evidence of continued infrastructure and quality of life improvements throughout Hillingdon, ensuring it continues to be a borough residents are proud to be part of."

The new hospital will be constructed in the grounds of the current one, with many elements built off-site and transported into place to minimise disruption. The existing building will continue to operate as normal until the replacement is complete.

It will have an improved layout and capacity, with 40 per cent more floor space and a significant increase in the number of single rooms.

There will also be more CT and MRI scanners to aid both the diagnosing and monitoring of conditions.

The building's energy-efficient design will help minimise energy bills and carbon emissions, and patients and visitors will benefit from a designated drop-off area, improved disabled parking and bus routes stopping within the hospital grounds.

Delivering more special educational needs school places

Work is under way at two schools as part of a multi-million pound investment to create more dedicated Special Educational Needs (SEND) facilities.

At Ruislip Gardens Primary School, the council is providing a specialist 16-place assessment unit for nurseryaged children who may need access to SEND provision, as well as a specialist resource provision with 12 places for primary-aged pupils with autism spectrum disorder (ASD).

Last month, work began at Charville Academy on another specialist resource provision to provide spaces for a further 16 pupils with ASD.

Cllr Susan O'Brien, Cabinet Member for Children, Families and Education, said: "The adaptations at the two schools are part of a wider programme to meet demand in specialist provision within Hillingdon by adapting existing provision, expanding some sites and creating new builds, while reducing the need for residents to access out-of-borough provision.

"Providing these dedicated places gives pupils the opportunity to learn alongside others in mainstream schools, while reducing

the reliance on independent provision, creating equality in social and educational opportunities which will enable them to thrive." Funding for the works comes from a capital release of £2.26million, of which ± 1.55 million will be funded from the council's SEND needs provision budget for 2023/24 and £709,000 from

the Schools Conditions Building Programme budget for this year.

To help meet future demand, schools and other areas designated for education are under continual review by the council to enable it to earmark any underused spaces that would have the potential to be re-purposed to meet the education needs of local children.

Modernising and adapting homes for older residents

A sheltered housing scheme in Cowley has undergone major renovation as part of a £230,000 council investment.

Improvements to 29 properties at Mandela Court and Biko Close include new kitchens, complete with anti-slip flooring, and fully upgraded wet rooms featuring new wall panels, shower units, grab handles and shower seats.

Where possible, energy-efficient heat recovery fans have been installed to control humidity and condensation. This helps to reduce heating bills and the risk of mould developing.

On Friday 28 April, the former Mayor of Hillingdon, Cllr Becky Haggar; Cllr Eddie Lavery, Cabinet Member for Residents' Services; and Cllr Jonathan Bianco, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Property, Highways and Transport visited the facility to view the refurbishments and meet with residents.

Mandela Court resident Hazel Farran said: "There isn't a word



in the dictionary to describe how good it is. My new kitchen and bathroom are simply stunning – it's like walking into a showroom."

Cllr Bianco said: "These refurbishments are part of our ongoing commitment to ensuring that our older residents can live healthy, active and independent lives in high-quality housing."

Further works in the pipeline for the scheme include internal decoration and carpet replacement, as well as improvements to communal areas.



Protecting the borough's natural habitats and wildlife

Seven nature reserves and country parks across Hillingdon are set to benefit from a new conservation partnership between the council, British Airways, Heathrow and London Wildlife Trust.

Designed to protect local wildlife, the 'Connecting with Nature in Hillingdon' initiative will help protect and enhance Minet Country Park, Cranford Country Park, Huckerby's Meadows, Yeading Brook Meadows, Ten Acre Wood, Gutteridge Woods and Ickenham Marsh.

The project will also create volunteering opportunities and build on the great work the council and



the trust are doing to ensure local communities can access and enjoy the green spaces in their local area.

Conservation work will be delivered with the expertise of London Wildlife Trust, and include cattle grazing, path and fence maintenance, habitat restoration and new planting, as well as wildlife surveying. To monitor progress, a ranger will be recruited to work closely with volunteers to look after the sites, and recruitment for these opportunities will open shortly.

Regular events, such as guided walks, will also be organised to help reconnect residents with nature.



Cllr Eddie Lavery, Cabinet Member for Residents'

Services, said: "We're delighted to see the London Wildlife Trust working with Heathrow and British Airways to bring some welcome improvements to key wildlife sites in the south of our borough.

"We're committed to creating a green and sustainable borough for residents, so we're grateful two of Hillingdon's biggest organisations are helping us to protect the greener pockets of our borough to safeguard them for current and future generations."



More council services are going digital – register today 🚺

As part of the council's commitment to being a digital-enabled, modern and well-run organisation, even more digital options are now available across a range of services.

More than 130,000 residents have registered for our MyAccount, a digital customer portal on our website, and are getting in touch online.

While you don't need a MyAccount to report things like fly-tipping, having one allows you to view realtime updates on the status of your reports or queries at any time. In the past six months we have handled 54,000 requests digitally, up from 37,000 in the same period last year.

Recently added services include managing your Hillingdon First card, Blue and Brown badge enquiries, adult social care support, registrar appointments, school admissions gueries and electoral services. In December 2022, we also introduced a new voice-automated system in our call centre, which supports the caller by providing a digital link to make a report or to request information guickly without having to queue on the phone for an agent. This also frees up staff to support residents who need additional help. Since its introduction, self-service digital transactions have

Uxbridge mechanic faces fine for ignoring planning notice

An Uxbridge mechanic has been ordered to pay more than £5,800 after failing to demolish a singlestorey extension that had been built without planning permission.

Ijaz Khan, who runs Jaz Auto Electrician, in Redford Way, appeared at Uxbridge Magistrates' Court for sentencing on Monday 19 June, having admitted one charge of failing to comply with an enforcement notice issued by the council at a previous hearing.

The court was told the council had issued the enforcement notice in April 2022, after planning inspectors found the single-storey unit was being used for car repairs/maintenance and residential purposes.

The notice required compliance by 26 August 2022, but a followup inspection by the council on 31 August showed no works had been done and the building remained.

The council felt the unauthorised building caused harm by damaging the street scene and having an adverse effect on the character and appearance of the residential area.

A new chapter for Hillingdon's libraries

In May, we agreed our new five-year Library Strategy which sets out our commitment to continuing to provide a first-class service for local people, while also ensuring it's efficient and sustainable for the future.

he strategy focuses on five ambitions that retain and enhance initiatives around: reading, literacy and culture; health and wellbeing; digital services and inclusion; information and learning; and sustainable service delivery.

Traditional library offerings, books, computers and information will continue to be provided, as well as the much-loved Home Library Service, mobile library, and a wide programme of free or low-cost events and activities, including early years sessions, dementia support, science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) related initiatives and work-experience placements that help young people develop their employment skills.

Ambitious for the future

We want to be more ambitious by looking for new ways to promote the service and attract new visitors. This will include developing initiatives to respond to residents' needs and investing in buildings and facilities (including digital systems) to improve customer experience and provide more opportunities for residents to engage with arts, culture, learning and wellbeing in a flexible community space.

To help deliver the service in a more efficient and sustainable way, we are introducing tiered opening hours. These changes have been designed to increase access at the most popular borough branches with longer opening hours after 5pm, and all libraries will be open a minimum of five days per week.

We continue to offer more branches and longer opening hours than neighbouring London boroughs, and the second highest number of branches in London.

Since 2019, the council has invested more than £250.000 enhancing its digital library collection so that residents can access a wealth of online resources for free and from the comfort of their own homes.

Court denies our ULEZ expansion challenge

Last month, our legal challenge was dismissed by the High Court, and it is now likely that the expansion of ULEZ will go ahead as planned on Tuesday 29 August.

he council is hugely disappointed that the High Court has determined that there is no legal impediment to the Mayor's expansion of ULEZ to outer London but accepts its decision.

Although the Mayor of London and TfL may have the legal right to implement the scheme, the question remains whether the public would agree he has the moral right to do so, given it was only the week before the judgement that the court of public opinion delivered a different verdict with the surprise by-election win in Uxbridge, an election that was seen as a referendum on the expansion of ULEZ.

It is evident that the Mayor of London and TfL do not realise the damage the extension will have to the lives of residents and businesses in outer London as well as those outside of its borders.

Leader of the Council, Cllr

Ian Edwards, said: "I am hugely disappointed for our residents and businesses and I call on the Mayor of London to further reflect on his plans. "Even the Mayor's own supporters are now saying that it is the wrong time to be expanding this scheme. Many thousands of low-income earners, vulnerable people ordinary workers and small businesses who are the beating heart of our borough will have to shoulder further costs which they cannot afford. It will cause even greater financial hardship and for some it will cause the loss of business or employment. "We will continue our fight on behalf of our residents and businesses through Parliament and at next year's Mayoral election. "I am proud that we had the

How may you be affected?

The ULEZ scheme is expected to be implemented across outer London boroughs, including Hillingdon, from Tuesday 29 August 2023.

This will mean that if you have a vehicle that does not comply with the ULEZ emission standards and isn't exempt, you will need to pay a £12.50 daily charge to TfL to drive inside the zone.

A two-day hearing was heard at the High Court on Tuesday 4 and Wednesday 5 July, with the judge, Lord Justice Swift, delivering his judgement on Friday 28 July.

The judicial review was brought on three grounds, all of which were dismissed:

• Failure to follow statutory procedure – Schedule 23 Greater London Authority Act 1999

• Unlawful and unfair consultation regarding expected compliance rates in outer London

• Unlawfulness regarding scrappage scheme, including failing to consider a buffer zone, irrationality and inadequate consultation.



Rolling out our food waste recycling service to council flats

he pilot scheme took place at six developments: Cochrane House, Uxbridge; Southcote Rise, Ruislip; Wordsworth Way, West Drayton; Victoria Road flats, South Ruislip; The Glebe, West Drayton; and Cowley House, Cowley; and involved 162 households.

More than 10,000kg of food waste has been collected since the start of the trial, making a valuable contribution to the borough's recycling targets. And now we're starting to install new food waste recycling units in communal bin areas at all councilowned blocks of flats. We're planning to deliver 25 new units per month in the next two years, offering the service to approximately 520 blocks of flats.



Residents living at the developments will be automatically signed up to the service, so there's no need to register. We'll contact households by letter to let people know when food waste collections are coming and share a leaflet explaining how to use the service. After that, our recycling officers will deliver a food waste recycling kit to each household, this will contain one indoor kitchen caddy and a roll of caddy liners.

Once the service is up and running on an estate and flats receive their kits, residents will be able to put their food waste into the special pedaloperated food bins, which will be installed in their communal bin areas.

We're also working with developers and managing agents on private developments to advise them about our food waste recycling service and encourage them to adopt it across their schemes.

Once you've signed up you will receive a kitchen caddy, a roll of caddy liners and a 23-litre lockable outdoor caddy to put your full bags into until collection day.

Transforming communities: Hayes regeneration under way

Work has begun on our flagship redevelopment scheme in Hayes which will deliver hundreds of new homes. Hillingdon People toured the sites to meet with residents and find out more.

he landmark project is being delivered in conjunction with developer Higgins Partnerships and will bring a welcome revitalisation of the housing estates at Avondale Drive and Hayes Town Centre.

At Hayes Town Centre, hoarding has been erected around part of the site and the gas and electrical supply has been disconnected and diverted to facilitate demolition works to phase one. Once the site has been cleared, construction on the first phase of 80 new homes is expected to commence in early autumn.

Excavations have taken place at Avondale Drive to map out the location of the water, drainage, gas and electrical supplies. Works will soon commence to demolish the car park between Glenister House and Fitzgerald House, to create a new long-term temporary car park and access road for residents.

Work on the first phase of 30 new homes is expected to commence on completion of the temporary car park.

Avondale Drive and Hayes Town Centre will provide a total of 740 new homes, with a combination of mixed-tenure homes, including

those for council rent, returning leaseholders, shared ownership and private sale. The developments will also include improvements to the public open spaces at each site. The affordable housing will be delivered earlier in the overall



programme and within four to five years. The first phase will create 110 new homes, 30 at Avondale and 80 at Hayes Town Centre, with residents expected to move in around spring/summer 2025.

Design of the two developments followed extensive consultation on the plans with residents of both estates to ensure they had a say in how the regeneration would look and what it should include. Furthermore, through its social values programme Higgins is also creating apprenticeship and employment opportunities for locals throughout the development's construction. Gemma Harling, who lives on the estate, is already on board as the new resident liaison officer for the scheme read more about her above right.

The development will also

include improved pedestrian and cycle routes, secure car parking, landscaping and children's play areas. At Hayes Town Centre estate a new community centre will replace the existing one.

Cllr Eddie Lavery, Cabinet Member for Residents'

Services, said: "We're committed to creating strong, thriving communities with more high-quality, affordable homes.

"We're delighted to be working with Higgins Partnerships on this project. Not only do they have an excellent track record in delivering such schemes, they also reflect our social values, by involving residents throughout, from getting their feedback via consultation to offering on-site employment and learning opportunities."

Supporting businesses by putting our town centres on the map

Revitalising the borough's town centres is a key part of our Council Strategy. We find out how a series of colourful posters at South Ruislip bridge are marking the area's vibrant history to help increase footfall.

n May, a set of six retro-style posters highlighting the local history of South Ruislip were unveiled at South Ruislip railway bridge.

'South Ruislip Stories' a series of posters inspired by old London Underground and Metroland posters, features three colourful prints on each side of the bridge, which detail key landmarks of local history.

It is a permanent installation and can be found at South Ruislip bridge, near the Tube station.

On Wednesday 17 May, the Mayor of Hillingdon, Cllr Shehryar Ahmad-Wallana, was joined by Cllr Eddie Lavery, Cabinet Member for Residents' Services, former Leader of the Council Sir Ray Puddifoot MBE, local ward councillor Cllr Heena Makwana (pictured below), and others involved in the project,

to unveil a commemorative plaque outlining the work. The vibrant pieces of work are already turning heads and have been warmly received by residents after helping transform this stretch of busy road.

The South Ruislip Stories project was fully funded by contributions from developers towards improvements in the town centre and HS2 amenity funding, with the content of the six prints overseen by Sir Ray, in conjunction with South Ruislip ward councillors.

The project was created in partnership with Transport for London, which owns this section of the bridge. The council is hopeful that Network Rail, which owns the other section, will also join the project in the future and support more posters.



Did you know?

- Northolt became the busiest airport in Europe following World War Two until Heathrow was built in 1954.
- The first jet to fly from Northolt was the De Havilland Comet – the world's first passenger carrying jet aircraft that changed world travel forever.
- RAF Northolt played a very important role in the Battle of Britain (1940) with pilots from Britain, Poland, Canada and Czechoslovakia (now Czech Republic and Slovakia).
- South Ruislip became part of Metroland, which was the fastest growing area in the country between 1930 and 1939.
- South Ruislip station was originally called Northolt Junction – it was designed in 1948 but not completed until 1960.
- St Mary's South Ruislip was built in 1959 by Lawrence King in the 'festival style' with the help of Ove Arup, who worked on the Sydney Opera House.



Cllr Lavery said: "This brilliant series of posters really adds some much-needed vibrance to the walk under South Ruislip bridge and I'm sure will brighten the journeys of the countless commuters who walk past each day.

"I'd like to thank Sir Ray who was integral in bringing this project to fruition, as well as former ward councillor Allan Kauffman and current ward councillor Cllr Heena Makwana for their input."

Could you be there for a child or young person in an emergency?

We're seeking compassionate individuals who are able to provide emergency short-term foster care to a child of any age or unaccompanied asylum-seeking children (UASC). If you can offer a safe and nurturing environment, please get in touch with our dedicated fostering team today.

s the name suggests, emergency foster carers need to be available at very short notice, at unpredictable times of the day or night, to look after children of any age for up to seven days.

Due to the unpredictability of the role and the types of children and young people needing their care, emergency foster carers must be easily contactable around the clock and be just as comfortable looking after a baby as they are supporting a teenager.

Typically aged 12 years and above, UASCs may also arrive at very short notice but unlike other children they will be completely alone, without the protection of their birth parents or family. They are also likely to have very few or no personal belongings, speak little or no English and they won't be in education.

UASCs may have escaped from conflict or turmoil in their home country and will need to feel

Support available

Emergency foster carers receive a weekly allowance. This has recently been increased by 3.5 per cent and rates range from £377.24 to £447.74 per week, depending on the age of the child. In return for the unplanned nature of the role, carers also receive a generous weekly retainer when they do not have a child placed with them. Additional funding is also provided to emergency foster carers to purchase clothing, small items of furniture or any other reasonable set up costs for the child. Similar support is provided to households who look after asylumseeking children or UASCs because of the special nature of the placements.

A thriving economy

Update from the Neighbourhoods Superintendent

I'm pleased to say that the investment in ensuring the strongest ever neighbourhood policing for London has begun with myself now becoming the dedicated Neighbourhoods Superintendent for Hillingdon. Previously, I also had responsibility for Ealing and Hounslow's neighbourhood policing.

I'm very much looking forward to working hard for the community together with our local authority partners to ensure that Hillingdon is as safe a place as possible to live, work, socialise and study in. This will be supported by the introduction of more police constables and police community support offers into ward-based policing, who will be supported by better training and equipment so they can serve communities to the highest standards.

Neighbourhood crime is often wrongly characterised as low-level anti-social behaviour and 'petty' volume crime. This viewpoint fails to understand the strong relationships between relatively minor offences and other more serious crime that it feeds. Drug gangs are funded and supported through shoplifting and acquisitive crime, while serious violence and sexual exploitation are

often linked to gangs who use these as methods of enforcement. It's for these reasons that we need to build on our current neighbourhood offering for Hillingdon.

Our refreshed approach to local policing will include a greater focus on the local issues that affect residents, including the protection of vulnerable people, the management of known offenders in the local area and an effective presence in known trouble hotspots. Whilst the Metropolitan Police Service (MPS) will always take the lead in fighting crime, we can only deliver public safety through the co-operation of our partners and the consent of our local communities, and how we do this in a better and more collaborative way will be the cornerstone of my work in Hillingdon.

Dedicated LGBT+ Community Liaison Officer

In the last few months, the MPS has announced that it's restoring full-time LGBT+ community liaison officers (CLOs) for each police borough command unit. This means that Hillingdon will share with Ealing and Hounslow a dedicated officer who will focus on working with LGBT+

people and organisations across the three boroughs.

The move is part of Commissioner Sir Mark Rowley's commitment to rebuilding the trust of London's LGBT+ communities, following a series of investigatory failings by the MPS where the victims were from the LGBT+ community. CLOs are also part of the commitment to deliver the strongest ever neighbourhood policing for London, and a crucial part of the mission to deliver more trust, less crime and higher standards.

The MPS worked closely with community members and the LGBT+ Independent Advisory Group to create the roles, listening to feedback in conjunction with a review of the current model that showed the expectations and requirements of LGBT+ community liaison had changed. By introducing the dedicated full-time LGBT+ Community Liaison Officer, LGBT+ people will have a single point of contact in Hillingdon who will work to rebuild those bonds of trust, which we recognise have been damaged over recent years.

Vaccinations – is your child up to date?

n the past few weeks there's been an increase in the number of measles cases locally. Measles spreads easily and can cause serious illnesses including pneumonia and meningitis.

The best way to help protect your child against severe illness from polio, flu, measles, mumps, rubella and other childhood



diseases is to get them up to date with their routine vaccinations.

In recent years, fewer children have been getting the vaccines they need to help prevent illness now and in the future.

The measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine consistently has one of the lowest take-up rates of all childhood immunisations. Uptake in London consistently lags behind the national average, and no areas in London currently meet the 95 per cent uptake target for childhood immunisations, as recommended by the World Health Organisation. As measles is currently circulating

in Hillingdon, it's important to make sure your child is protected and up to date with their immunisations.

All vaccines are thoroughly tested to make sure they will not harm you or your child. Once a vaccine is being used
