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elcome to a new year and the first edition of *Hillingdon People* for 2019.

V In this issue, you will be able to read about our budget for 2019/20 and how we have been able, through sound financial management, to continue to invest in services and facilities whilst not levying a social care precept and either freezing or applying a small rise in council tax. In comparison to the rest of the country we continue to buck the trend in what are difficult times for local authorities. Helping you to improve your health and fitness is a common theme in this edition. The council runs a range of facilities, sessions and events to help residents of all ages and fitness levels to keep active.

At the end of last year we opened six new outdoor gyms following applications from residents via our Chrysalis programme. We also relocated an unused clubhouse in Yiewsley to nearby Sipson Recreation Ground, and refurbished it for use by the growing youth football club West Drayton Explorers and the local community. Making sure that local teams and sports clubs for all ages have appropriate facilities to keep active is a key council priority. One of our biggest challenges as regards the health of our residents of all ages is to improve air quality and to oppose any proposal that will make it worse. Accordingly

the first round of our legal challenge to oppose the expansion of Heathrow will commence in the High Court in March and will probably run for a number of years. The health and wellbeing of our residents, whether affected by poor air quality or noise from the proposed expansion remains a priority and we have, without affecting expenditure or any council service, set aside sufficient funds to fight this proposal, for however long it takes. Improving your environment and supporting local business also remains important and our rolling programme of improvement works is currently enhancing Uxbridge and Eastcote, and two new shop front grant schemes have been introduced in Charville. In this edition you can also read about how the plastics you recycle as part of our free weekly collection service are helping to protect the environment by being remanufactured into a range of products. Our people, our environment and our heritage supported by sound financial management, continue to be at the heart of everything that we do and I wish you all the best for the year ahead.

Waste and recycling site plans halted by Network Rail

The council and waste management company Powerday are disappointed by a move by Network Rail, which threatens to block plans for a new civic amenity site in West Drayton.

Last year we announced our intention to work with Powerday to provide residents with a muchneeded waste and recycling site in the south of the borough.

Part of the Old Coal Yard site off Tavistock Road, West Drayton, which is owned by Network Rail and leased to Powerday, was earmarked for the facility and the proposal was given planning approval in May 2018.

The council already runs popular monthly waste weekends at the site, and has done so since 2009. The new facility was planned to operate throughout the week.

However, Network Rail has now told Powerday of its intention to use the wider site for freight activities, including additional freight train movements via the Colnbrook Loop, effectively scuppering plans for the site.

The new facility was set to be a welcome addition to existing services, offering residents in the south of the borough a more convenient alternative to Harefield Civic Amenity Site. It

was also due to receive controlled amounts of trade waste material - a beneficial service for small local businesses. It is not vet known how Network Rail's plans will affect the current monthly waste weekend service enjoyed by residents

Cllr Keith Burrows, Cabinet Member for Planning, Transportation and Recycling, said: "This is an incredibly disappointing and frustrating decision by Network Rail, to say nothing of the poor timing. Residents and businesses have long been calling for a waste and recycling site in the south of the borough, and the

Tavistock Road site was the ideal solution. "Despite planning

approval, Network Rail has come up with a number of objections and obstacles to our plans. We are seeking one last meeting with them to see if there is any practical way in which a slightly scaled down civic amenity operation might be accommodated with additional freight and train uses of the site. "After doing everything necessary to get this

site up and running as quickly as possible, it will be very disappointing if a new facility doesn't materialise here, and it will undoubtedly come as quite a blow for residents."

Polish Air Force Heritage Trail launched



The contribution of the Polish Air Force during the Second World War was commemorated on Friday 2 November at the launch of a new heritage trail to honour the Polish Air Force Fighter squadrons based at RAF Northolt.

It was at RAF Northolt that No. 303 (Kościuszko) Squadron, was formed in August 1940, which went on to become the most successful Fighter Command unit in the Battle of Britain.

The Polish Air Force Heritage Trail leads visitors to four locations in the borough (The Battle of

A visit was also made to the Orchard pub, where airmen relaxed between their flying missions during the war, before continuing on to the Battle of Britain Bunker Exhibition and Visitor Centre for the official launch.

Cllr Puddifoot said: "The contribution of the Polish Air Force in this country's hour of need cannot be underestimated. In both fighter and bomber squadrons the Polish Air Force served with gallantry, honour and distinction. We are honouring the service and sacrifice of those who served at RAF

facilities, including two central courtyard gardens, a dementia resource centre, restaurant, consulting rooms and hairdressing salon. The council has invested £24 million in the scheme. and is also investing in another extra-care housing project, Park View Court, in Yiewsley. This will provide a further 60 extra-care flats and is due to open later this year. Cllr Philip Corthorne, Cabinet Member for Social Services, Housing, Health and Wellbeing,

Encroachment clamp down

Residents who have illegally extended their garden into one of our parks or open spaces are being targeted as part of a crackdown.

A recent survey by our green spaces team has discovered that the problem of encroachment is widespread across the borough, with 45 cases recorded and many more suspected. Now the council is taking steps to reclaim its land and protect advanced mapping it for future generations.

Of the 45 investigations, 18 have resulted in residents voluntarily handing land back to the council. The rest of the cases are yet to be resolved.

In the first instance,

on council land is written to and asked to reinstate the correct boundary. Anyone who fails to do so may be prosecuted.

Residents who are unsure about their boundaries are advised to contact the Land Registry or ask the council for an inspection. Inspectors are able to use a range of modern techniques to identify the correct boundary, including technology and aerial photography.

Larger fines introduced for littering and graffiti



The council has introduced tougher fines for littering, graffiti, fly-posting and handing out leaflets in the street without permission, as part of a crackdown on anti-social behaviour.

Fixed penalty notices for the four offences were raised from £80 to £100 in September.

The increase, which reinforces the council's zero-tolerance approach to environmental crime, was made possible by the introduction of new laws that give local authorities

the power to change fixed penalty notice amounts for certain offences. The discount offenders

get for paying their fines early has also been reduced. Ányone who fails to pay

their fixed penalty notice within 14 days risks being taken to court and fined up to £2,500.

Cllr Douglas Mills, Cabinet Member for **Community, Commerce** and Regeneration, said: "These offences might not seem serious to the people who commit them, but they blight residents' lives and are hugely detrimental to our neighbourhoods. We hope that the threat of a heftier fine or an appearance in court might make someone stop and think before they act."

Man fined for using outbuilding as home



A Harmondsworth man has been ordered to pay more than £3,000 after being caught using an outbuilding in his garden as a home without planning permission.

Rajinder Rajawat, aged 56. of Bath Road breached an enforcement notice ordering him to stop using the garden building as a self-contained dwelling.

Appearing at Uxbridge Magistrates' Court on Monday 8 October, Rajawat pleaded guilty and was told to pay a £2,000 fine, £986 costs and a £120 victim surcharge.

Pupils helped to avoid dangers of drugs and crime

In the last six months the schools-based initiative, Your Life You Choose (YLYC), has advised more than 1,300 Hillingdon young people on the dangers of illegal drug use and knife crime. The Magistrates'

Association in conjunction with the Metropolitan Police launched the initiative at Stockley Academy in April last year and have been joined on school visits by drugs education charities, Victim Support and the council's youth offending service.

Years 7 and 8 at Haydon School, Eastcote were the latest to benefit from the programme, which delivers discussions about drugs, grooming, young people and the law, knife crime and the role of magistrates.



The YLYC team were joined by the youth offending service, victim support services, and the Daniel Spargo-Mabbs Foundation, a drugs education charity at the school at the end of October.

Cllr John Hensley, a former magistrate, (pictured) said: "Actions that young people think of as minor can sometimes have serious consequences. For example, the children are surprised to learn that a person could be charged

with common assault no matter how slight the attack might be - or even if they just make another person think they are about to be attacked. So these events are great at helping children to avoid 'crossing the red line' and getting a criminal record."

The workshops will continue throughout 2019 and it is hoped that they will be delivered to all secondary schools in Hillingdon.

Young people learn about importance of safe driving



In November around 1.800 students from 17 schools and sixth forms in Hillingdon and Uxbridge College attended an annual educational event, which focused on the importance of safe driving.

The council-run sessions, which are organised in conjunction with the Metropolitan Police. London Ambulance Service, for Girls, said: "We think London Fire Brigade and Transport for London were held at the Winston Churchill Hall, Ruislip and featured a film and hardhitting real life experiences from live speakers. Members of the emergency services and parents of accident victims described tragedies they have encountered, and former teenagers whose lives have been damaged

by poor decisions behind the wheel also talked about the impact this has had on them.

Members of the public were able to attend a free special evening performance on Thursday 22 November.

Thamika St Louis and Amelia Merce, both 16 from Swakeleys School all 16-year-olds and above should watch this live event because everyone our age is either getting ready to learn to drive or going to be in a car with someone our age who's driving. The videos were very emotive, vivid, shocking and make you really think about how decisions can affect you. The experience will stay with us."

Putting residents first

The council continues to put the needs of its residents at the heart of everything it does and has a strong record of successfully delivering balanced budgets whilst maintaining and improving the services that matter to you.

ike all local authorities, Hillingdon has suffered substantial reductions in Central Government funding over a number of years at a time when a population rising at both ends of the age spectrum has resulted in an increase in demand for central services.

Despite this, our sound financial management has meant that you have not seen a rise in your council tax in the last 10 years (12 years for the over-65s) and we have not levied the social care precept of 2 or 3 per cent a year since its introduction three years ago.

In comparison with the rest of the country, last year the average combined council tax and social care precept increase was 5.1 per cent, with London authorities averaging 3.66 per cent. Hillingdon was one of only two London authorities to not raise council tax or levy a precept.

As regards the coming financial year 2019/20, we will, for a fourth

consecutive year, not levy a social care precept and council tax for those over the age of 6<u>5 will again be frozen.</u> Council tax for other residents will only be increased at a maximum of 90 per cent of what our three neighbouring boroughs increased their tax by in 2018/19 (Ealing, Harrow and Hounslow). This would mean a 2.40 per cent increase, which is around 51p a week for a Band D property.

Help improve your local environment by gardening

As the year begins, have you thought about trying something new for 2019 by taking up gardening?

Growing plants, flowers, fruit and vegetables at your own property, allotment or local community project not only improves the environment but is a rewarding recreational activity benefiting your health, fitness and social opportunities.

Öur Hillingdon in Bloom and Autumn Show competitions will both return later this year and we'd love for more residents to take part. Now is an optimum time to start preparing your site and planning what and where

you'd like to grow plants or produce, in readiness for the spring.

Vegetable beds can be prepared by digging to aerate, drain and warm soil and adding compost or covering in plastic ready for sowing in March.

You can start to sow vegetables, such as chillies, peppers, cucumbers, leeks and spinach under cover or start to plant more hardy vegetables, such as broad beans. beetroot, carrots and early peas. Winter flowering shrubs that have finished flowering and deciduous trees can also be pruned.

We see a variety of displays each year in Hillingdon in Bloom,

and a range of prizewinning entries of fruit, vegetables and flowers in the Autumn Show.

Applications for both competitions will open during National Gardening Week on Monday 29 April on www.hillingdon.gov.uk/ *bloom.* Last year we had many first-time entrants who won garden centre gift voucher prizes - in 2019 it could be you!

Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, said: "We

ensured that all residents were able to benefit from a council tax freeze for a decade, which was remarkable given the wider financial climate. Funding pressures, which are out of the council's control, are not going away and are in fact increasing, which has meant that we have needed to carefully review next year's budget.

"Having built up record levels" of financial reserves, we are able to continue to weather the storm but raising council tax by this small amount will contribute £2.7 million a year towards maintaining services and fund care for those who need our help."

Keeping older residents warm, safe and entertained

The Leader's Initiative for Older People helps to keep older residents safe, active and independent. Last year, projects funded new burglar alarms, temporary heating and Christmas parties for over-65s in the borough.

Festive parties, activities and outings

total of £20,000 from the Leader's Initiative supported seasonal parties and outings for more than 20 local clubs, organisations and charities in the lead up to Christmas. Groups that benefited from funding included Hayes and Harlington Community Association and Crane Community Centre in Hayes; Bell Farm Christian Centre Lunch and Social Club and Pretty Asian Ladies in West Drayton; Just Friends, Royal British Legion, Tudor Club and Elm Park in Ruislip; The Mandela Court's Diamond Club and Club 87 in Cowley; and Uxbridge Community Centre.

Crackers were pulled, party frocks (and obligatory paper hats) were worn, jokes were shared, traditional Christmas dinners (with all the trimmings) were eaten and prizes won in raffles and guizzes, as more than 1,000 older residents joined in various festivities.



Nine of the council's sheltered housing schemes celebrated with parties of their own, with meals, live entertainment and raffles. Residents from Barr Lodge Sheltered Housing Scheme, West Drayton, took a coach trip to London to see the famous Christmas lights, stopping in Covent Garden for hot chocolate. To complete their day, the group headed back to the scheme for a fish and chip supper and to exchange secret Santa gifts.

Members of the Salvation Army Cameo Group Hillingdon enjoyed coffee, lunch and a musical sing along at Sunbury Court – a restored 18th century mansion with picturesque grounds in Sunburyon-Thames.

West Drayton and Yiewsley Senior Citizens Welfare Association organised a coach trip to Milton Keynes. Its 50 members enjoyed a raffle on board the coach and a day walking around the shops and browsing the Christmas market.









The Northwood and Pinner Liberal Synagogue hosted a Chanukkah Party, where 100 members of the local community shared lunch and refreshments with children from the Clore Shalom School Choir. After lunch, the children entertained guests with a variety of songs, including traditional Chanukkah melodies and their own school song. Members of the Singing for the Soul group encouraged everyone to join in a sing along session and the afternoon finished with a candle lighting ceremony, led by Rabbi Aaron to celebrate Chanukkah.

Free burglar alarms

Last year, the Leader's Initiative also provided more than 1,000 over-65s in Hillingdon with free burglar alarms to help keep them safe and reassured in their own homes.

Among those residents was Michael Richards, 65, from Northwood, who received a new burglar alarm in November. Michael described the service as superb and was extremely happy with the installation. He said the professional who fitted it was efficient and explained everything he needed to know about the alarm.

Heater loan scheme

Homeowners aged 65 and over can also apply for a short-term loan of an electric heater during the winter if their heating breaks down.

The scheme provides a heater to borrow for up to two weeks while residents are waiting for their heating to be repaired. After the loan period, one-off grants (of up to $\pounds 45$) are also available to cover electricity costs

Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, said: "I am delighted to see so many of our older residents benefiting from these schemes and we will continue to support over-65s in 2019."

He said: "Security is something I've worried about for a while, but now I feel much more secure and sleep easier at night. All credit to Hillingdon Council."

Celebrating a year of Tovertafel

A new interactive light game system that helps people living with dementia relax and reminisce was introduced in four of the borough's libraries in November 2017. Now, more than a year on, the Dutch device - known as Tovertafel or 'magic table' - has benefited hundreds of residents, brought families together and helped make libraries even more inclusive spaces.

he council invested in Tovertafel in 2017 as part of its commitment to ensure that people with early onset dementia engage in meaningful activities, are valued and able to contribute to their community.

The device, which can also be used by children with learning difficulties and autism, projects animations such as leaves, fish and jigsaw pieces onto a table top, and allows users to interact with the light by moving their arms and hands.

The combination of light and sound provides physical and mental stimulation and is reported to encourage movement, eye contact,

social engagement, focus and reminiscence.

Hillingdon is the only borough in the world to provide this facility in libraries. This, and a range of other council-led initiatives aimed at supporting residents with dementia, recently led to the Alzheimer's Society formally recognising the borough's efforts towards becoming a dementia friendly community.

Nearly 200 residents have attended special Tovertafel sessions since their launch.

Anne and Bernard Bransfield, from Uxbridge (pictured top) have been going to the Tovertafel sessions since they started at Botwell Green

and Uxbridge libraries. Bernard, aged 73, was diagnosed with Alzheimer's four years ago and has also recently been diagnosed with Parkinson's disease. Although Bernard sadly isn't able to converse as much as he used to, Anne, who is Bernard's wife and primary carer, says it makes a difference to Bernard when he plays the games.

She said: "It is a wonderful, wonderful invention which motivates

everyone. I try to get my husband to interact as much as possible, and there are some days that he will. He definitely seems better on the days that he's here.

"It's also good for me because I can come and have conversation and interact with people. There was a lady here from a care home, and she sat in front of the games for ages and wasn't interacting with anybody. And then all of a sudden her hand went on the table - she just touched it and she thought it was the most wonderful thing in the world. It was lovely for all of us to see. And at Christmas time our grandchildren come along with us and they love it."

Anne added that she has seen the size of the groups grow through word of mouth: "We go every week and it's like our second home. We are very grateful as, without the council, we wouldn't have the facilities. It's our lifeline."

Fred Bowen, (pictured left top centre) who first started coming to Uxbridge with his late wife more than two years ago, also enjoys the social benefits of the magic table sessions. He said: "It has become a conversation tool because you play the games and talk across the table. Children get involved with it too, including children with autism. Here we feel like we're not a burden - we're an asset."

Chris Baird represents the company who brought the Tovertafel to the UK and Ireland and praised Hillingdon's initiative in investing in the tables for public access.



He said: "We've been extremely impressed by the council's enthusiasm, thoughtfulness and insight in providing spaces that are dementia and learning-disability friendly. Their commitment to providing facilities to help isolated people provides a fantastic example of how local leaders can make a significant, and direct, impact for residents and their carers." The tables are installed in Botwell Green, Uxbridge, Ruislip Manor and Northwood Hills libraries, as well as





Grassy Meadow Court extra-care development and the Wren Centre in South Ruislip. The library table sessions are free to use and can be used as part of the regular Dementia Friends' coffee mornings or booked for personal sessions. To book a session contact the library directly.

This is just one of several initiatives the council runs to improve the quality of life of those living with dementia. Dementia Friends' coffee mornings are held at Botwell Green, Uxbridge, Ruislip Manor and Northwood Hills and new coffee mornings were launched in the autumn at Yiewsley and Harlington libraries. In response to feedback from residents with early onset dementia, a Dementia Friends' coffee morning specifically for early onset dementia will also be launched at Northwood Library from January.

Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, said:

"Dementia is one of the biggest public health challenges we're facing over the coming decades, with another 500 people expected to be diagnosed in Hillingdon in the next two years alone. We are delighted to lead the way and enable all those living with dementia, and their carers, to have easy access to this amazing invention."

What our learners say

Hillingdon resident **Rita Patel** spent 14 years as a deputy head teacher for a west London primary school, before suffering a life-changing stroke in 2014. This sudden and shocking event left her unable to walk or talk.

In addition to the physiatry support she received from the Stroke Society, Rita attended an adult learning course as part of her physical rehabilitation. She said: "I decided to attend a seven-week pottery outreach course with Hillingdon Adult and Community Learning. This really helped motivate me and made me determined to regain use of my right hand."

Rita now volunteers in a local school once a week and will be travelling to India in early 2019 to volunteer in a



school there. Rita hopes she can soon return to work. She added: "I think everyone is always learning and I encourage people to keep on learning. Don't just stay at home, but get out and get what you want - be whatever you want to be."

For those considering more vocational courses, there is a broad selection on offer.



Sobia Habib first considered a career in teaching after helping her three children with their homework. After approaching various organisations about vocational courses she says Hillingdon Adult and Community Learning (HACL) was the most helpful.

She said: "I discovered HACL online, the staff there are so encouraging and they advised me to take an assessment. Following this I went on to study GCSEs in English and Maths, passing with good grades in both subjects.

She added: "I have lived in Hillingdon for many years and all my children attend school here. I'm very happy with the progress they're making and my studies have helped me understand the different approaches and teaching methods used in schools today. Attending adult learning classes has confirmed my ambition to pursue a career in teaching."

In order to gain experience in a classroom, Sobia is currently volunteering with HACL in a functional skills maths class. She says: "At first I was nervous and I worried that I wouldn't be able to help anyone in the classroom. Now I am much more confident and very happy. The student I work with has

gained full marks in his exam and I look forward to working with him in class. It gives me a real sense of purpose."

Sobia hopes to eventually get paid work as a teacher

Helping our town centres to thrive

The council continues its rolling programme of improvement works in town and village centres, ensuring they remain attractive places to live, socialise and do business. Hillingdon *People* brings news of an impressive new mural in Uxbridge, the launch of two shop front grant schemes and progress on an innovative 'anti-flood' garden in Eastcote.

mural dedicated to the late Kate Fassnidge, a wealthy local landowner, has been created at the Fassnidge Yard end of Uxbridge High Street.

Installed by professional mural artist Mel Holmes, the striking artwork adorns the Cedars building, which was the Fassnidge family home until Kate's death in 1950.

The Fassnidge family's large Uxbridge-based building and construction company was founded in 1796 and went on to become a major employer in the borough. As well as working on notable industrial premises, pubs and schools, Fassnidges were

After the death of her husband, Edward James Sidney in 1921, Kate created a six-acre memorial park for him in the gardens of their Uxbridge home. The park opened in October 1926 in a ceremony attended by more than 2,000 people. She later handed it over to the council in her will, along with several other properties on Uxbridge High Street, including the Cedars building.

Fassnidge Park, in Rockingham Road, is one of the council's award-winning Green Flag parks and it remains popular with local residents today.

The mural, which is in the style of a William Morris print as a tribute to the Sanderson wallpaper and furnishing company that manufactured fabrics in Uxbridge from 1919 until 1999, puts the finishing touches to the first phase of a £2 million improvement project in Uxbridge.

The project has also seen new paving, signage, lighting and benches installed outside Tesco, and a new play area for children in nearby Fassnidge Yard.

A second phase of works will get underway in January, beginning with the installation of some new benches and trees outside the Pavilions shopping centre.

There are also plans for new paving, benches, trees and flowerbeds between Vine Street and the Civic Centre, and there will be changes to the road layout to allow vehicles to turn around more easily near the Civic Centre. The council also plans to install a bus stop in Vine Street.

Elsewhere in the borough, the council's flagship shop front grant scheme, which has already benefited hundreds of small businesses, has been extended to Charville. Traders in Kingshill Avenue and Hayes End Parade, in Uxbridge Road are being invited to apply.

Successful applicants will have 80 per cent of the cost of shop front improvements, such as new signs, awnings, refurbishments and minor repairs, covered, as well as access to professional design expertise. The scheme is widely regarded as a practical and economical way of attracting new customers and boosting business, while improving the look and feel of an area for residents and visitors.

In Eastcote, work is well underway on the installation of a 'rain garden' - an attractive and eco-friendly area that uses plants and shrubs to improve drainage and help prevent surface water flooding during particularly heavy rainfall. The garden, which has already been drawing positive feedback from local residents, is due to be completed by April. In Hayes, new street lighting has been installed between St Anselm's Church and North Hyde Road and the area will be getting new paving.

Whatever your age, fitness level or interest, here are just some of the ways you can exercise this month and beyond...

Leisure centres

This January, if you're ready to get back to the gym or want to try a new sport or fitness class, our leisure centres offer the perfect environment.

At Hillingdon Sports and Leisure Complex, Uxbridge, more than £200,000 has been invested in a new floodlit 3G pitch, which can be set up as a full-size 11-a-side pitch or three smaller pitches for football and rugby games. The centre boasts new industry-leading, one-of-a-kind and award-winning indoor cycling bikes. Botwell Green Sports and Leisure Centre, Hayes also offers fantastic facilities, including a 3G football pitch, a purpose-built gymnastics hall and a toddler soft play area.

On Wednesday 16 January, it's the Badminton Racket Pack Festival, which is run in association with Hillingdon primary schools and Badminton England and encourages young budding badminton players to participate. Hillingdon Sports and Leisure Complex and Botwell Green Sports and Leisure Centre both offer a range of badminton sessions for the public, including Friday night classes, adult and junior coaching sessions and 'no strings' fun sessions where people of all abilities can simply turn up and play.

Mary, 59, from Ruislip, said: "The sessions I had were excellent and I learnt so much from my instructor about road safety and how the mechanism of a bike works."

Denise, 55, from Uxbridge, had never ridden a bike before. She said: "After just four hours of training, I was able to ride around the park unaided. My instructor was fantastic and I definitely want to continue riding."

The council also organises guided cycle rides of various levels in different parts of the borough and responsible cycling is welcomed in all of our parks and green spaces. Fassnidge Park, Uxbridge, is home to the Rusty Bike Cafe and Recycle-a-Bike, which recycles unwanted bicycles into affordable bikes for the local community, helping to reduce the number of bikes that end up in landfill. The workshop also sells bike spares, accessories and provides a wide range of basic services, such as safety checks and brake adjustments.

How our apprenticeships have set us on our career paths

Ross Chaplin, 19, from West Drayton

Ross has completed his first year of a two-year Building Control apprenticeship. His apprenticeship will lead to two qualifications: a Level 3 BETEC Diploma and a Level 3 NVQ in Surveying, and he hopes to become a



chartered surveyor.

He says that he has so far found it challenging and a good learning experience.

He explained that when he was searching for an apprenticeship he looked at what the council was offering as he has always been interested in the work it does. He knew he wanted to do something related to construction.

He said: "I was relieved when I got it as it's such a good career path to go down and this apprenticeship can branch into so many areas."

During his first year he has worked with the building control administration team. At times he has found it tough as it is his first proper job but he has gained so much experience. "I've registered nearly every type of application there is in the service and I have dealt with a range of queries. The team provides me with tasks and support me in learning how to complete them. I enjoy meeting clients. At first I accompanied a colleague but now I'm confident and proficient to be able to go by myself," he added.

Ross' favourite part of the job is going on visits with the surveyors and learning on site. As well as learning on the job, Ross goes to college at Westminster once a week.

Ross will now spend his second year working with the building control surveying team. He said: "I would love to stay at the council as I really enjoy helping the community in which I've grown up."

Ryan Galvin, 17, from South Ruislip

Ryan applied for an apprenticeship at the council as it seemed like a diverse organisation and was local to him.

He said: "I came straight from school and had no idea what I wanted to do in the future but knew that the council could be a good starting point for my career."

Ryan's one-year Level 3 apprenticeship in Business Administration began in September 2017. He worked as part of the technical administration team carrying out a range of jobs across a variety of services, such as the crematorium, car parking, highways and planning.

He said: "I enjoyed learning on the job and my team were really supportive in showing and explaining what I needed to do. It was really different from school but I embraced the change and working more independently. One of the biggest things I learnt was the importance of communicating with my colleagues."

Ryan started a secondment in the business assurance team in July as he was nearing the end of his apprenticeship. He had completed some work in the service as part of his apprenticeship and found it really interesting and wanted to ensure he could stay at the council.

He said: "I now have a lot more responsibility and it's a good challenge. I see a future in this role and have found what I was looking for before I started my apprenticeship."

Brandon completed a one-year Level 3 apprenticeship in Customer Service in December and has gained a permanent role in the council's contact centre.

He describes the whole experience as enjoyable, and has said that the training has really increased his knowledge of local government and improved his communication skills.

He said: "I was 16 when I applied for the apprenticeship via the council's website and was very surprised to get it. I had just left school and I didn't know what I wanted to do."

The contact centre is usually the first point of contact when a resident calls the council, and Brandon said that the mixture of on-the-job training with support from his colleagues, and training outside of the office at the Stowe Centre in London, helped his development.

He said: "It has been a real journey of learning. At first I was quite shy but as I progressed through the apprenticeship my confidence grew.

"I really focused on learning about the various council services and improving my customer service skills. I have learnt how to communicate confidently and helpfully in a professional manner. My colleagues have been really helpful and supportive and I really enjoy the working environment."

While other councils are reviewing their strategies to stop plastic recycling – in response to waste import bans imposed by countries that once accepted the nation's waste – Hillingdon ensures its collected plastics are given a new lease of life.

s part of the council's dry mixed recycling collections service, plastic materials are remanufactured by UK-based recycling specialists into a range of useful items, including fence posts, phone cases, garden chairs, milk bottles, carpets and even clothing – and here's how...

The clear recycling sacks that you fill each week are collected by the council's waste and recycling service and taken to a material's recycling facility in Edmonton. Automated sorting machines separate the materials into paper and cardboard, steel, aluminium, glass and plastics, as the next stage of the process is dependent on the type of material that is being recycled.

Plastics are then transported to Biffa Polymers – a state-of-the-art recycling facility in Redcar, which recycles 1.5 million tonnes of mixed plastic packaging each year. Here, plastics are sorted by their original structure and split into three groups – HDPE Noncoloured, HDPE Jazz and PET.

At this stage, milk bottles are put through a range of specialist recycling equipment, which cleans them, removes their caps and labels. The end result is super clean plastic, known as flakes.

All plastics, including the flakes (made from the milk bottles) go through an extrusion process, whereby the plastic is melted down into small pellets. Once cooled, they are placed into colourcoded bags, so that they can be easily distributed and remanufactured. The pellets are now ready for the next and final stage of their recycling journey.

HDPE Non-coloured plastics

The majority of milk bottles are made from translucent, non-coloured plastic and the pellets made from these are sent mixed with new plastic and then 'blown' into new milk bottles. Milk

bottles are unique in the recycling system, as they are processed within a closed loop, meaning they are recycled back into their original form. No other recycled plastics can be made into milk bottles

HDPE Jazz plastics

Mixed coloured bottles, such as shampoo bottles, bleach bottles and squeezy sauce bottles, have a number of reuses once recycled and can be made into items such as underground pipes, paint cans and garden furniture.

PET plastics

Clear food and drinks bottles and jars, which contain products such as water, mayonnaise and peanut butter, will generally be recycled back into bottles. They can also be transformed into tote bags, furniture, carpets, panelling and fleece fabric.

Remember to check the list on the clear sacks or the information on our website to see what can and can't be recycled. Please empty and rinse all containers before putting them out for collection to ensure that everyone's efforts to recycle don't go to waste

Garden and food waste and textiles are also collected as part of our free weekly collections. Earlier this year, a free bulky waste service was also introduced for larger items.

Cllr Keith Burrows, Cabinet Member for Planning, Transportation and Recycling,

said: "I am delighted that we are bucking the trend of local councils in England with a successful recycling strategy that focuses on what's best for residents, while balancing value for money, efficiency and environmental need. Thanks to all of our efforts, Hillingdon is ranked fourth out of the 32 London boroughs for recycling.

"These statistics show that communities across the borough are committed to recycling, but there's always more that can be done to improve our recycling rates and protect our environment."

Hillingdon's Kids in Care Awards (KICA) is an annual celebration of young people in care and care leavers who have made an outstanding achievement in their lives.

he 2018 awards took place on Saturday 10 November at the Sofitel Hotel in Heathrow. Now in its ninth successful year, KICA has been taking place with the support of Sofitel since 2009.

This year, 149 looked after children donned their finest outfits and walked proudly down the red carpet

at the glittering event all planned by a panel of young people.

The celebration began with an opening video from the actor, comedian, and television host James Cordon, speaking from his desk on *The Late* Late Show. There was also a welcome film

from the council's Chief-Executive, Fran Beasley.

Hillingdon's Deputy Mayor, Cllr David Yarrow was also in attendance at the event, in which two separate ceremonies took place - one for those under 16 and another for those slightly older.

Once again it was a huge success, with this year's carnival theme proving to be particularly popular with all who attended. One young person described the evening as 'amazing' and said they liked how the council acknowledges the achievements of young people in care.

There was singing, rapping and dance performances by local young people, in addition to a karate demonstration, poetry and a moving motivational speech in which one

young person reflected on her own journey through care.

All the young people who attended received a certificate, a KICA keyring and a gift voucher. Nominations were made by social workers, personal advisors, virtual school staff, foster carers, key workers and teachers.

> Eliot, 19, won an award for positive change and enthusiasm. Eliot, who first went into care when he was just nine, said that one the most difficult things he has had to face on leaving care is learning to pay for bills. He would keep forgetting passwords and needed

help sorting out his finances. Eliot said: "I think it's harder for children in care because they are not

around their family and they have to do more things for themselves. You also have to get used to lots of new people, like social workers and independent visitors, which I have found really hard."

Despite the challenges, Eliot now

attends Capel Manor College where he is learning agricultural studies. He also regularly volunteers at Hillingdon's Rural Activities Garden Centre.

Helia, 19, came to England alone aged 15. She explained that the most difficult thing

about being in care was building relationships with her social workers and trying hard to fit in. She said: "I wanted to show them my abilities. My social workers and my personal advisor have got to know me, my needs and undertaken pathway plans with me. They have seen that I care about my goals, and have helped me towards these by opening up opportunities for me."

She has worked incredibly hard to achieve her main goal, which is to gualify as an anesthetist. In 2016 she passed five GCSEs and progressed to AS Level to study Biology, Maths and a BTEC in Information and Communication Technology. In 2017

Helia achieved an overall Distinction following completion of a BTEC Level 2 Diploma in Applied Science and Technology at City and Islington College. She is now studying a BTEC Level 3 in Applied Science and continues to excel as a student

Update from the West Area BCU Superintendent

As I write the January 2019 column for *Hillingdon People*, I wonder where the last 12 months went. I concluded; very quickly! As I reflect on the achievements we have made and the plans going forward, I am confident that my officers will continue to deliver outstanding results (despite all the cuts we are facing).

We ended the year with close to 500 fewer burglaries, that's 500 fewer lives affected (in addition to their wider families and the local community) and 500 fewer crimes to investigate. These results could only be achieved by our strong partnership with the council and also the public taking personal responsibility to protect themselves. We have also seen a downward trend in knife crime, with far fewer victims than the previous 12 months.

We are supported by an excellent Neighbourhood Watch Scheme, the recent OWL programme and of course the work of the Safer Neighbourhood Board (SNB). There are Safer Neighbourhood Boards in every borough across London, established by the Mayor's Office. They are run and chaired by volunteers and exist to challenge partners and hold the police to account for crime reduction and the promotion of community safety. In terms of achievements Hillingdon SNB has funded a number of initiatives, including theatre groups visiting schools to discuss knife and drug crime; more recently a police-led football group for young people; and the delivery of OWL. On Saturday 23 February they are holding a public meeting, at 10am at The Global Academy in Hayes,

'Gold' standard uniform for **Hillingdon's firefighters**



London's firefighters are now wearing gold coloured uniform in the biggest update to London Fire Brigade (LFB) clothing in eight years.

The new personal protective equipment, which was rolled out in October, includes a helmet, tunic, leggings, protective hood, boots and

two types of gloves. The new fire uniform will support

up dirt and damage more easily than the old navy coloured fire gear and new additions, including helmet torches and lightweight rescue gloves, allows more dexterity for use on non-fire related incidents like road traffic collisions.

LFB's fire investigation dogs Sherlock and Simba also have new gold tunics to match those of the firefighters.

Disabled facilities grants offer more independence

The council is helping to greatly improve the quality of life of disabled residents across the borough by making practical adaptations to their homes.

e provide grants to disabled people, when works to adapt their home are needed to meet their specific needs. Grants can be provided for residents who own their homes as well as those in rented properties.

The types of work the council carries out varies considerably. For example, making it easier to get into and out of the home by building a ramp to the front door, or making adaptations to bathrooms such as a level access shower.

Some works are simply to make a home safer, or easier to move around and live in, by widening corridors or adapting heating or lighting controls.

Angela Moran moved into her new home in Uxbridge in October 2018. The property is in a modern development of 30 high-quality housing units for older people.

Angela has multiple sclerosis, a condition which can affect the brain and spinal cord, causing problems with vision, arm or leg movement, sensation and balance.

Angela said: "I use a wheelchair and I am unable to open doors by myself. This effectively left me trapped in my last home because I was unable to move about freely, get in and out of bed unaided, or even go outside without assistance."

One of the council's occupational therapists met with Angela in her home to assess her needs and discuss what adaptations should be made. Once a plan was agreed, the council's adaptations team visited Angela and began the works.

They installed automatic doors Angela said: "I can now move about "The works were started just before

and windows throughout Angela's home and are also installing two mobility hoists - one in the bedroom and one in the living room - that will allow Angela to get in and out of her armchair and bed with greater ease. Her bathroom was also specially adapted into a wet room to provide safe and comfortable bathing facilities. my home independently. It's amazing; even my patio door is automated so l can get out onto my balcony with ease. My bathroom is so much better too. I moved in so disruption was kept to a minimum. I'm very pleased with my new home and delighted to have regained my independence."

Cllr Philip Corthorne, **Cabinet Member for Social** Services, Housing, Health

and Wellbeing, said: "We are providing help to improve the home environment of those who struggle to afford essential adaptations. This is giving our disabled residents greater choice and the opportunity to lead more independent lives. We are also giving people who struggled to be mobile outside of their homes the flexibility to live their lives in an independent way."

Daniels have lived in their home in Ruislip for more than 30 years. Mrs Daniels struggles with the stairs and Mr Daniels uses a wheelchair.

In October 2018 the council adapted their bathroom and made it bigger to allow for full disabled use and access. They extended the bathroom partway into a garage that was converted into a third bedroom. They also made the hallway wider, so Mr Daniels can move about his home with greater ease. The works took about one month to complete.

Mrs Daniels said: "I have nothing but praise for everyone at the council who has helped us. They were all marvellous from start to finish, they did an excellent job and I cannot fault the work. We are both extremely grateful, and the adaptations have greatly improved our quality of life."

Applicants for disabled facilities grants are means tested, unless the work is for a child under 18-yearsold. Applicants in receipt of certain types of benefits are also exempted. In some cases a contribution to costs may be requested.
