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In this issue you will be able to read about our budget for 2018/19 and how for a 10th successive year your council tax will be frozen and for a third successive year we will not levy a social care precept. Residents over the age of 65 may be receiving their 12th year of a council tax freeze and once again Hillingdon residents will pay fees and charges for council services and facilities at least 10 per cent cheaper than residents in our neighbouring boroughs.

As well as being able to maintain the council tax freeze, we are continuing to provide the facilities and services that our residents value, including our libraries, awardwinning parks, free burglar alarms for the over-65s and a weekly free of charge refuse and recycling collection. On top of which we will be building a new swimming pool and providing another waste and recycling centre.

It is more telling at this time of year, as councils across the country are setting their budgets in what remains financially challenging times for local government, just how important our policies of sound financial management and good business practice are in enabling us to continue bucking the trend of tax rises and service and facility cuts.

In this edition you can also read about a variety of new facilities we are currently building, including the Battle of Britain Bunker Exhibition and Visitor Centre, set to open this spring, a housing development in Hayes for older people and the extensions at two of our primary schools to offer more places for local children.

This year we will commence a new refurbishment programme to modernise and further improve all of the borough's libraries to continue to meet residents' needs and we will also provide support for activities and facilities for our uniformed groups, Scouts, Guides and Cadets.

We are also supporting local businesses with shop front grants, and a host of public realm improvements to provide town centres that you can feel proud of. Updates on our LED lighting upgrade, alley gating scheme and programme of works at our tower blocks also illustrate our commitment to making improvements and keeping our residents safe.

We will continue to put you, our residents first and at the heart of all that we do and I wish you all the best for the vear ahead.

Hillingdon scooped a prestigious Gold award in the 2017 Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) Britain in Bloom competition on Friday 27 October and also won the Large City category.

This was the first time that the council has been overall winner of this category and the second time the borough has won Gold in the competition, which celebrates horticultural achievement, community participation and environmental responsibility. Hillingdon first won Gold in 2015.

"We are absolutely delighted to win Gold and the Large City category against such strong competition. This is a fantastic achievement for Hillingdon and will add to our long list of accolades for outstanding parks and green spaces. We'd like to thank all the council employees, residents and volunteers who have put so much time and effort into making Hillingdon such a wonderful place to enjoy and visit."

Cycle security success recognised

More than 2,900 bicycles were security marked in Hillingdon last year, leading to a prestigious award for the borough's Safer Transport Team.

The group, which is a partnership between the council, the Metropolitan Police and Transport for London, recently won the Most Amount of Bikes Marked Award at the 2017 Cycle Crime Conference, having marked and registered a total of 2,969 bikes in 2016/17.

Regular bike marking events and an advice-based burglary prevention initiative called 'Sheducation' have been credited with reducing the number of shed break-ins and cycle thefts in the borough. The team also targets local cycle shops, encouraging them to register and mark all the bikes they sell.

Council-secured funds pay for new bus

Money secured by the council as part of a planning agreement has funded a new bus service between Uxbridge and Hayes.

The new U5 service, which departs from Hayes and Harlington Station at 8.33am on weekdays, was introduced by Transport for London after the council successfully negotiated a section 106 agreement with Inland Homes Plc, the developer of Drayton Garden Village.

Cllr Keith Burrows, **Cabinet Member for** Planning, Transportation and Recycling, said: "Residents had told the council that more buses were needed along the route and we're pleased to announce that thanks to this agreement they now have access to six Uxbridge-bound buses between 8am and 9am rather than five. The extra bus is particularly good news for those who commute to Stockley Park."



The council continues to invest in the borough's library service and will commence a new refurbishment programme this year for all of Hillingdon's 17 libraries to modernise and further improve these existing facilities to continue to meet residents' needs.

Ruislip Manor Library (pictured) was the first library to be rebuilt in the last refurbishment programme and celebrated its 10th birthday in October. Ten years on, the space which is a much-loved hub for the local community, is in need of a decoration refresh and the council has appointed a designer to draw up plans.

Cllr Richard Lewis, Cabinet Member for

Central Services, Culture and Heritage, said: "This new programme will focus on each of the borough's libraries, making improvements to enhance the look and feel of the environment, such as introducing new colour schemes, installing new flooring or carpeting, moving furniture to improve access and creating new work or lounge spaces. The council has also listened to your feedback, and additional power points will be created to meet your digital requirements, so you can bring your own electronic devices to work or study."

Magic tables launched to support people with dementia

An innovative Dutch invention that provides stimulating light games for people with dementia was officially launched at Uxbridge Library on Friday 24 November as part of the council's ongoing efforts to make Hillingdon a dementia friendly community.

Uxbridge is the first library in the UK to get a Tovertafel ('magic table' in English), which projects animations onto table surfaces and allows users to interact with the light by moving their arms and hands.

The games are designed to provide physical, mental and social stimulation for people in the mid to later stages of dementia but can also be used by children and people with learning disabilities, autism and early-stage dementia.

Six residents from the Uxbridge dementia coffee morning group were the first to test out the new table during an official demonstration at Uxbridge Library, attended by Boris Johnson, MP for Uxbridge and South Ruislip and Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot.



Cllr Ray Puddifoot,

said: "We must do all we can to improve the lives of those living with dementia, as well as seeking out new ways to help those diagnosed in the future.

"The Tovertafel has been shown to help people to relax, reminisce and focus their minds, and it's easy to use. For residents who might otherwise have difficulty interacting with each other, this is a marvellous opportunity to be social, get some exercise and have some fun."

Four magic tables have been installed in Uxbridge, Botwell, Ruislip Manor and Northwood Hills libraries and are available for groups and residents supporting someone living with dementia to use for free on a regular basis. There is a Friday session at Uxbridge Library at 11am for anyone who would like to try out the table. To book to use a table, contact one of the libraries directly.

LED street lighting update

Our ambitious £5.2 million street lighting upgrade project is running ahead of schedule and on target for completion by August.

More than 10,000 street lights in Hillingdon, nearly half of those in council-owned streets, have now been upgraded to LED by civil and electrical firm McCann. Seven hundred concrete light columns have also been replaced with modern steel columns.

Cllr Keith Burrows, Cabinet Member for Planning, Transportation and Recycling, said: "The new LED lights will be more efficient and cost effective, as they are expected to last for 20 years in comparison to the four to five years of the previous bulbs. They will reduce the carbon footprint, use less electricity, be more robust and cheaper to maintain. Residents will also benefit from the brighter and better quality of lighting, which will ensure streets are safer for motorists and pedestrians and discourage anti-social behaviour."

Building firm fined for illegal fly-posting

A west London firm and its director have been ordered to pay £1,820 in fines and costs for illegally advertising their business in the Ruislip area.

CI Langs Buildings Solutions Ltd. of Pembroke Road, Ruislip, and its 18-year-old director, Quie Doherty were prosecuted by the council after the company put up advertising boards in Northdown Road, West End Road, Grove Road, Grove Way, and at the junction of Kingsend and West End Road without permission. Promotional signs were found attached to a tree, before but they didn't take any traffic cone, telegraph pole and street sign in September, and to street signs and street lighting in October.

The case was heard by Uxbridge Magistrates' Court on Monday 6 November. The company and Doherty pleaded guilty via post to six offences each under section 224 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.

Each party was fined £600 (£100 per offence) and ordered to pay £280 in costs, plus a £30 victim surcharge.



Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, said: "We have warned CJ Langs about this sort of activity notice, leaving us with no option but to prosecute. Some of the signs were nearly a meter high and clearly intended to attract the attention of drivers.

"Advertising rules are there to protect legitimate trade and ensure that no-one is getting an unfair advantage. While we support local businesses, we simply can't tolerate people flouting the rules in this way."

Vehicle stopchecks result in fines for unlicensed waste carriers

The council teamed up with the Metropolitan Police, Environment Agency and Driver and Vehicle Standards Agency for a vehicle stop-check operation in West Drayton, Yiewsley and Cowley in October, aimed at clamping down on flytipping, unlicensed waste carriers, overloaded vehicles and criminals who use the road network.

The operation, which resulted in hefty fines for some drivers, was initiated by the council, and led jointly with the Police Partnership Tasking and Environmental Enforcement teams.

It saw 27 drivers stopped and 14 fined £300 each for failing to prove within seven days that they held the necessary waste transfer records or licences. Failure to pay the fine could result in prosecution.

Three vehicles were seized because they were not roadworthy, one was seized for not being taxed or insured, and one driver was fined £100 for failing to prevent his vehicle's load from falling onto the highway. Numerous other vehicles were found to be overloaded and were either seized or allowed to leave once the weight had been reduced. The police also fined a number of drivers for traffic offences.

Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, said: "Fly-tipping is one of the most complained about issues in the borough and I'm supportive of regular and rigorous checks on anyone who uses our road network to transport waste. I'm also pleased to see tough action being taken against those who don't have the necessary documentation to prove their activities are above board. This is a great example of how the agencies work together to combat crime and anti-social behaviour in Hillingdon and I commend everyone involved for their efforts."

Construction gathers pace on new development

The council held a traditional topping out ceremony on Thursday 19 October to mark the significant progress in the construction of a stylish new housing development for older people.

The extra-care flats, which are due to open in June at



Grange Road, Hayes, will offer the comfort of a private home but with the added security and peace of mind of professional care on-site.

The Mayor of Hillingdon, Cllr Carol Melvin and Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot visited the site and laid some bricks at the front of the building to mark

the major milestone in building work.

When finished. Grassy Meadow Court will provide 88 extra-care flats and communal facilities for older residents with additional needs. Set within woodland near the Beck Theatre, the quadrangular block

of four storeys will boast two central courtyard garden areas, a state-ofthe-art dementia centre, Wi-Fi and secure access. Each of the flats will also have its own winter garden balcony or landscaped terraced garden.

The council is also constructing another development for older people in Yiewsley. Park View Court in Farrier Close is due to open in August, providing 60 extra-care flats.

Cllr Philip Corthorne, **Cabinet Member for** Social Services. Housing, Health and Wellbeing, said: "We are investing in two large housing developments to

support older people with additional needs, and we're delighted to see the progress of the building work thus far. Once completed, these modern homes will provide the very best facilities to older residents who want to continue to live a fulfilling and independent life. The sites are both conveniently located near local shops and facilities, and homes will have the added benefit of on-site care support to provide peace of mind for residents and their families."



Helping you to keep warm this winter



he council's heater loan scheme runs throughout the winter and offers the short-term loan of electric heaters to residents aged 65 and over if their heating breaks down.

Homeowners experiencing heating problems can request a heater to borrow for up to two weeks while they are waiting for their heating to be repaired.

During the loan period, one-off grants (of up to £45) are also available to cover electricity costs and will be paid once the heater is returned in a satisfactory condition.

Council tax frozen for successive year

The council will once again deliver a council tax freeze for all residents for 2018/19.

espite continuing reductions in government funding and a population rising at both ends of the age spectrum which is putting increased pressure on our services, the council will freeze council tax for a 10th successive year for 2018/19. It will also be the 12th year that council tax is frozen for over-65s.

For the third year running, Hillingdon residents will not be charged the social care precept (an additional charge of up to three per cent added to council tax bills, which 147 out of the 152 councils in England added in 2017/18).

The budget also indicated that there will be no reduction in service delivery with no facility closures, a continued free weekly refuse collection and recycling service, and most fees and charges will continue to be set at a rate that is at least 10 per cent cheaper than those in neighbouring boroughs.

There will also be continued investment in facilities and services, including:

- additional school places at both primary and secondary level
- further investment in local highways, totalling £3 million for 2018/19

- £30 million funding for a new swimming pool in the Yiewsley/West Drayton area
- boroughwide library and leisure centre refurbishment programmes
- a new recycling centre in the south of the borough
- a free bulk item collection service for residents
- support for youth uniformed groups (Scout, Guides and Cadet)

Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, said: "Despite the financial challenges created by the continuing funding reductions from central government and an evergrowing population, I am proud of everything that we have been able to achieve. A 10th successive council tax freeze is remarkable, as is our ability to continue improving facilities and deliver services that our residents value. This has been as a result of our sound financial management and good business practice, which really sets Hillingdon apart from other councils."

Battle of Britain Bunker receives precious collection of World War Two flying ace

Work at the new £6 million
Battle of Britain Bunker
Education and Visitor Centre

he council is now the proud custodian of a precious collection of Royal Air Force (RAF) artifacts belonging to Battle of Britain flying ace Wing Commander Ronald Gustave Kellett, DSO, DFC, AE.

The Kellett family handed the collection over last year to its new home at the Battle of Britain Bunker, which was the secret heart of Britain's air defence during World War Two.

Wg Cdr Kellett served locally and was stationed at RAF Northolt during



the Battle of Britain in 1940 as the British commanding officer of 303 Squadron, a Polish fighter squadron, cementing a special Hillingdon connection. By the end of the Battle of Britain, Wg Cdr Kellett had destroyed five enemy aircraft, two 'probables' and damaged one.

Wg Cdr Kellett's children, Jan Dryburgh, Judy Williams, Victor Kellett, Louise Pemberton and Jonathan Kellett, who made the donation, explained they were looking to donate their father's artifacts as they felt it was important to keep all of the items together. They said that with five siblings and 14 grandchildren they were concerned their father's collection would be split up and he would be forgotten. Consequently, they decided that the Battle of Britain Bunker was the best home after meeting Daniel Stirland, Senior Curator, at a Polish Air Force dinner.

The donated items include his medals awarded for distinguished acts of valour and courage: the Distinguished Service Order (DSO), Distinguished Flying Cross (DFC), and the Polish Virtuti Militari (VM) awarded to him by General Sikorski for his leadership of 303 Squadron. Other highlights include correspondence, a flight logbook

and photographs - including one when he met King George VI.

Judy Williams, said: "Meeting Dan came at the right time and we are pleased that future generations will be able to admire them and that his legacy will be kept alive at the bunker. This is an amazing place. It is amazing to think of the hard work of the people working down there and they must have known the pilots, including father."

Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, said: "We would like to thank the Kellett family for this historically significant donation. It is wonderful that the Battle of Britain Bunker is home to Wg Cdr Kellett's medals, so near to his old base at RAF Northolt. We even have a replica of the Hurricane plane he flew in the colours of 303 Squadron standing guard at the entrance to the underground bunker."





Exhibition and Visitor Centre building progress

Who is really behind the Stop Northolt campaign

At a Council meeting on Thursday 2 November, Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, issued an open challenge to those organisations, commercial or otherwise, and individuals funding and running the scaremongering campaign, Stop Northolt, to stop hiding and declare both themselves and their specific interest and level of financial support provided.

e said: "We defend our residents against inappropriate developments such as HS2 and the Heathrow expansion plans, and believe me if there was any truth at all in the scaremongering rumours about expanding Northolt Airport being put about by an unidentifiable but well funded group similar to Back Heathrow, we would be leading the fight against that. And as we have done with both HS2 and the Heathrow project, funding the residents' groups running the campaigns against these proposals.

"In fact in the interests of openness and honesty, I think tonight we need to put out a challenge to those funding and running the Stop Northolt campaign, to either 'put up or shut up.' By the end of this month I would ask them to send to me the names and addresses of all involved in managing the campaign and a list of all expenditure incurred to date, with details of who is providing the funding and the amounts provided to date. We will publish this request and details of the responses in the next edition of *Hillingdon People* and allow residents to judge for themselves the validity and purpose of this organisation. I will also report the response or lack of response, to the next Council meeting."



Speaking after the meeting, Cllr Puddifoot said: "If this is a genuine residents campaign they will have no hesitation in providing the information requested. However if they are a commercial organisation or self interested individuals they will duck and dive and prevaricate doing anything to avoid providing a truthful answer. Should that, as anticipated, be the case our residents can make up their own minds as to the real interest of the organisers of this campaign and as a council we will treat them appropriately."

By mid-December no information had been received and Cllr Puddifoot stated: "As anticipated the scaremongers are not interested in openness and honesty using their spokesperson to declare "what does it matter who is funding Stop Northolt.....we need a council cabinet committed to returning the aerodrome to RAF use only." I have however been informed that the campaign is being funded by Biggin Hill Airport who have a commercial interest in acquiring the private aircraft flights currently using Northolt. They have commissioned a professional campaign organisation who claim that there are ways of telling a story that "become almost infectious and they change minds."

In an earlier campaign for Biggin Hill it was claimed "one of its main challenges is grow [sic] its business in what is otherwise a green and residential area." The local authority. Bromley, objected to a request for increased opening hours and in this case the campaign organisation went as far as producing a short film stating, "The film was used as part of the campaign to persuade Bromley council to approve their request for longer opening hours." The campaign film was circulated "on social media channels and sent directly to a 30,000 strong mailing list of supporters, as well as councillors and officials. The campaign was successful, with the request gaining approval."

Cllr Puddifoot added: "I have no issue at all with Biggin Hill trying to grow its business and take flights from Northolt, or using considerable sums of money to fund the Stop Northolt campaign but to do it in such an underhand manner is not acceptable. For the avoidance of doubt, Hillingdon Council will not be directed on policy matters by Biggin Hill or its paid campaigners and we will as I stated at the last Council "treat them appropriately" as they rightly deserve."

Creating more places at Hillingdon schools

Expansion works are underway at two of the borough's primary schools to ensure that Hillingdon continues to provide enough school places for local children.



arrender Primary School is being expanded to offer an additional 210 places (30 per year group). Site preparation work started in July to form two new Reception year classes and a temporary hard play area ahead of the main building works which commenced in November.

A brand new two-storey building will accommodate eight new classrooms, an ICT suite, library, Design Technology room, group spaces, staff and administration space and toilets. The existing staff room and hall will also be altered to enlarge the hall space and create a kitchen and servery area. The existing car park will also be reorganised in order to increase capacity. External works include remodelling of pathways leading to the main entrance, and installation of a new multi-use games area (MUGA) and a sports pitch. There will be a partial handover of the new building for the new academic year, with all works expected to be fully completed by the end of 2018.

Hillside Infant and Junior Schools are also being expanded to offer an additional 216 places (30 per year group plus six nursery places). As with Warrender Primary, work started in July ahead of the main building works which commenced in November.

A brand new stand alone building will accommodate 12 new classrooms, hall, studio, ICT suite, library, Design Technology room, kitchen, group spaces, staff and administration spaces and toilets. The existing car park will be reorganised and a new drop-off facility, incorporating a second access point, will be created to provide a separate entrance and exit. External works include remodelling the existing entrance, reorientation of the sports pitch and installation of a new twocourt MUGA. Subsequent works to the existing school building will facilitate the reorganisation of the infant school. There will be a partial handover of the new build for the new academic year, with all works expected to be fully completed by early 2019.

The work is part of the council's

ambitious £260 million primary and secondary school building and expansion programme - one of the largest in London, to meet demand for school places in the borough as the local population continues to grow. The council is investing £153 million in primary schools and has so far created 6,682 new primary school places since 2011.

Shop front grants hailed a success by local retailers

In the past seven years, more than 180 small businesses have benefitted from the council's shop front grant scheme.

he scheme covers 80 per cent of the cost of shop front improvements such as new signs, awnings, refurbishments and minor repairs, as well as professional design expertise through commercial designers 'Designed by Good People'.

Now widely regarded as one of the most successful of its kind in the UK, the initiative has gained a reputation among retailers as being a practical and economical way of attracting new customers and boosting business. It is also used as an example of best practice by other councils.

As the council prepared to issue its 200th grant, *Hillingdon People* met some recent recipients.

WENDY'S Hairdressers



Wendy's Hairdressers, Windsor Street, Uxbridge

Wendy's, run by sisters Molood Gaykhareh and Zahra Kikhareh, decided to take part in the shop front scheme after customers struggled to read the name of their shop. With the council's help, the pair were able to afford a new sign and fresh paint works to the doors and windows.

"We've been here for 16 years, the lady before us had the shop for 27 years, and no work was done to the outside during that time," said Molood. "It wasn't nice at all and people new to the area couldn't find us because of the sign. Now people can find us much more easily and we've had lots of nice comments from customers."

Although the shop has only recently had its facelift, Molood says the changes have already had a positive impact on trade. "Business has

definitely improved as a result, and it's good for Windsor Street, keeping it looking nice and clean," she added. "It certainly was a big help for us."

R.V. Ralph, Windsor Street, Uxbridge

R.V. Ralph watch repair shop, opposite Wendy's, seized the opportunity to get a classy new sign for their shop. Steve Williams, who manages the shop with his brother Chris, said: "We've been in Uxbridge for 39 years, although the business has been in the family since the 1920s.

"It was actually quite convenient for us because our uncle who used to run the shop retired four-and-a-half years ago and we'd been thinking about getting a new sign - not because anything had changed, but because it's nice to have a new start."

Steve is hopeful that in today's difficult financial climate, the new sign will ultimately help trade. "We're pretty confident that it can only be an improvement," he said.





World Of Flowers, Field End Road, Eastcote

Getting a new sign, an awning and fresh window boxes marked the end of a tough couple of years for World Of Flowers. The florist, which has been a stalwart of the Eastcote community for 60 years, sadly burned down in February 2016 following a heater malfunction and was forced to temporarily move premises, only recently returning to its newly-refurbished shop.

Business owner, Lena Archer said she wanted to keep their existing look but enhance it. "It's only been a couple of weeks but people have said that when they come through Eastcote, it's lovely to look at," she said.



ISF, Ryefield Avenue, Hillingdon

Shop front grants were recently offered to businesses in Ryefield Avenue, Hillingdon, as part of a trial to extend the scheme beyond town centres. Intelligent Security and Fire Ltd (ISF) was one of eight businesses in the small parade of shops to take advantage of the offer. They heard about the scheme by word of mouth and used it to get a brand new shop sign and vinyl graphics for the windows.

John Reynolds, Managing Director, said: "We were looking to move but decided to stay here and turn it into something that works for us. People have commented on how nice it is to see the shop looking so refreshing compared to how it used to look, and we're very pleased with it because it has actually introduced new customers to us. It's going to be a boost for trade and a lift for the local community."



Neelam has been a hub of the community for 41 years, providing a much-needed Post Office service for local residents. Run by Gaurave 'G' Sood, his dad Pradeep and his brother Jay, the store was in desperate need of a new sign and repairs to its canopy.

"It was a real help, because signs are so expensive nowadays," said G. "If the council didn't run the scheme we probably wouldn't have been able to do it. We have seen some new faces, and it's lovely because they've cleaned up the top of the buildings so the whole area ties in together. Now we have a nice area to be proud of. It's making a huge difference."





Cllr Douglas Mills, Cabinet Member for Community, Commerce and

Regeneration, said: "It's no secret that town centres, and in particular small businesses, have been having a tough time in recent years. But we have refused to turn our backs on them, preferring instead to support them by investing in our own town centre improvement schemes and offering shop front grants to give businesses the cash boost they need to make their own improvements. We will aim to support local economy across our large town centres and smaller parades offering opportunity for economic growth."

The shop front grant scheme is just one aspect of the council's commitment to improving town centres and ongoing public realm improvement works are also being carried out in each area.

Could you and your neighbours benefit from an alley gate?

The council has been providing funding and support for an alley gating scheme for the last 10 years to help residents and businesses protect their privately owned alleyways from intrusions. We find out how the scheme has benefitted residents.

he installation of lockable gates can greatly improve quality of life for residents and businesses by helping to reduce the likelihood of burglars gaining access to the rear of properties, and protecting the alley from fly-tipping and other anti-social behaviour.

Funding is available for alley gates through the Chrysalis programme. The council welcomes applications for alleyways that serve at least six households, and successful applicants will be offered up to 90 per cent of the cost of alley gates. Once installed, future maintenance and ownership is the responsibility of residents.

Some of the schemes that have been completed within the last year

Deters fly-tipping

Westbourne Road/Widmore Road, Uxbridge

The occupiers of the houses in Westbourne Road and Widmore Road asked for an alley gate to be installed following a series of flytipping incidents and anti-social behaviour. A gate was installed in July, which has successfully prevented further incidents.

Prevents burglaries

Victoria Road and Bridgwater Road, Ruislip

Residents applied for an alley gate following a number of burglaries that affected the houses in the local area. There were also incidents of fly-tipping, and people had been using the alley to access Bridgwater Open Space.

Najat Pearce, who organised the gate, said: "We'd like to thank the council for its help and support with the installation of the gate through the alley gating scheme. We requested a gate behind our homes due to anti-social behaviour and recent burglaries. The online application process was simple and since installation, residents now feel more

secure in their homes."

A local resident submitted the application for Chrysalis funding for the alley gating scheme last year, and the gates were installed in October. **The lead resident** said: "In recent years, we have experienced a lot of anti-social behaviour. The alleyway was used by drug dealers who used to park their vehicles and exchange drugs there. The gate is now preventing this from happening."





Improves safety

Springfield Gardens and Pine Gardens, Ruislip

Terry Wigington, the lead resident for the scheme, applied for an alley gate to help residents feel safe. He said: "As Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator for the area, I was approached by several neighbours regarding the installation of two security gates, one at either end of the rear alley of our properties. Applying to the alley gating scheme was very easy and intuitive. All of the relevant paperwork and information is supplied and the support from the council was very much appreciated. They did a superb job, no mess, took all the soil away and left us with a fine pair of security gates that are admired by many."

Cllr Douglas Mills, Cabinet Member for Community, Commerce and

Regeneration, said: "The council's alley gating scheme has been extremely successful in helping communities come together to address safety concerns, fly-tipping and anti-social behaviour on their doorstep. We would encourage more residents and businesses to make the most of this offer to help improve the quality of life in their area."

The council's annual Kids in Care Awards (KICA) were held on Saturday 18 November at the Sofitel Hotel in Heathrow, to celebrate the achievements of children in care and care leavers in Hillingdon.

he awards ceremony recognised young people who have overcome a difficult upbringing or challenging circumstances to make an outstanding achievement in their lives; whether this is achieving excellent exam results, making a contribution to the community, doing well in sport, or making personal progress improving their own development, self esteem or sense of wellbeing.

The event was designed, planned and hosted by young people, and was attended by the Mayor of Hillingdon, Cllr Carol Melvin, and Hillingdon children and their carers. In total, 198 young people were nominated.

Cllr David Simmonds,
Cabinet Member for
Education and Children's

Services, said: "This year's KICA has been so inspirational and shows that, with the right support, young people in Hillingdon can achieve anything they put their mind to. We are so proud of all of the children who come into our care, and we will continue to ensure that all young people across the borough have the opportunities and guidance to reach their full potential."



Mohammed, 22, came to the UK unaccompanied six years ago to seek asylum. Donna Smith mentors Mohammed and nominated him for a KICA award for his commitment to education. Donna said: "Mohammed has no family in the UK and despite this, he has pushed himself and worked extremely hard to achieve good grades. He is

now doing his BA (hons) degree in Mathematics at Kingston University. Everyone is so proud of him and what he has achieved."

Mohammed said: "When I first heard that I was nominated for an award in education I couldn't be more happy and proud of myself. I came to the UK at the age of 16 from Somalia. There has been civil war there since 1991, and my parents wanted to get me out so I would be safe.

"When you first go into care it can be traumatic, and the most difficult thing for me was seeing other kids in college with their parents at the end of classes, which always reminds me of my mum. When you are in care you start living as an adult straight away, whereas most children will still have their parents to do things for them. I had a couple of really good social workers and they were all so helpful in assisting me with advice. I'm now excited for my future."



Ruby, 17, was also nominated for her commitment to education. Ruby was placed in the council's care when she was five-years-old, as her parents were unable to look after her. Ruby said: "The most difficult thing about growing up in care is not being able to concentrate. Sometimes you have a lot of thoughts

running through your head as to why you were put in care, and you wonder if things will ever change.

"I have overcome my GCSEs which was a big challenge, and my social worker, Asefaw, has helped me pursue a career in medicine. I think kids in care have more challenges than children who do not grow up in care, because we have a lot more going on and can be affected after making

Our children have left home and our property is now too big for myself and my wife. There are too many rooms and the associated bills are costly. How can the council help?

The council encourages tenants living in a property with too many rooms to consider downsizing. Moving with too many rooms to consider a smaller property will help to reduce bills and allow the council to give the property to someone else, particularly families who require multiple bedrooms.

Moving seems like a huge, daunting task, there are so many things to deal with all at once and it is overwhelming to sort on my own. How can you help?

Our Home Release Reward Scheme can help you downsize. Financial incentives of up to £4,500 will assist with the costs associated with moving and setting up a new home. We also recognise that moving home can present practical issues. You may have benefit or rent arrear issues, registration problems, uncertainty in changing or disconnecting utilities or unwanted items to clear, but the council can help with this. Your Tenancy Management Officer will be happy to visit you and discuss any barriers you think there might be and help you, in addition to the reward payments.

Shirley and David Flanders, 70 and 72, downsized to a one-bedroom bungalow in Harefield in September 2016. They had previously lived on the 12th floor of a tower-block in Hayes for 18 years. Shirley said: "The lift only went up to the 11th floor and David has chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, a lung condition, so it was hard for him to walk up the stairs. David's condition worsened in the last few years and he had been in and out of hospital. We had a spare room that we didn't really use after our daughter moved out. We had both recently retired and we made the decision to apply to downsize to try and find a more suitable property for our needs."


David said: "I have always lived in the Hayes and West Drayton area but we decided we wanted to move to Harefield. I used to deliver bread there and knew the area well. It's much guieter, which we like. When we got this bungalow we were gobsmacked."

Shirley said: "Within a couple of days, after accepting the property, we were told we could move. We asked for an additional week so we could organise everything and it all went really well. The council gave us a financial incentive to move and we have also spent our own money on redecorating our new home.

"I understand why downsizing is a hard decision for some people. They may think that moving is too hard and it may feel daunting to start again somewhere new but we would really recommend it. We don't regret doing it. We wish we'd done it earlier! David's health has improved since we moved. We have a front and back garden which is great. There's a ramp, so David can go outside and sit in the back garden to get fresh air. We have one bedroom, a kitchen, a wet room bathroom and a living room. It's a good size overall. There have also been financial benefits as our utility bills are much cheaper now."

The new LED lighting will be brighter, which could deter anti-social behaviour and it is more environmentally friendly and efficient. The emergency lighting will stay on for longer, allowing extra time for repair works to take place and make it safer for residents if a power outage occurs. Additional

surveys were carried out at

Rabbs Mill House, Uxbridge; and Fitzgerald House, Glenister House and Wellings House, Hayes. Following the feedback from these, the council is undertaking some planned upgrading work at these sites. Work previously planned for these blocks, including providing additional insulation to stop the

spread of fire should it occur, fitting new and more efficient electric night storage heaters and redecorating communal areas has also been brought forward to take place at the same time. The windows will also be replaced in Rabbs Mill House.

Overnight security will be provided throughout the planned works on these four blocks to ensure properties are secure and residents are encouraged to speak to the council if they have any questions about the work.

All of our tower blocks are fitted with up-to-date Gerda Premises Information Boxes. These allow the Fire Services to see the plans and layout of the building. They also detail the location on-site of any specialist equipment, such as oxygen canisters.

Maintenance work is not limited to tower blocks, fire safety is prioritised in all council-owned buildings. Currently a range of improvement works are also planned and taking place across our 23 sheltered housing schemes.



Cllr Jonathan Bianco, Cabinet Member for Finance, **Property and Business**

Services, said: "Fire safety is prioritised in all of our councilowned buildings and our tower blocks are no exception. The safety of residents is paramount. Our rolling programme of inspections and maintenance works take place to ensure that should a fire or an emergency situation occur, we are able to fully protect those who live there."

Updates from the Borough Commander

I've been to a number of public and community events in the last couple of months and have been getting some really good feedback about the increased engagement and presence of our dedicated ward officers. As you know, we have two per ward and they are now equipped with and getting used to their tablet devices, which is like having the office computer in the palm of their hand. Knowing who your local officers are, seeing them out and about, and telling them about the things that matter most, so they can do something about it, is really important. When organisations change, as the Metropolitan Police is currently doing right now, strengthening community policing in this way maintains public confidence and helps us fight crime.

To update you on some of the changes that are underway, you will know by now that the front counter at Uxbridge closed in December and that Hayes Police Station now has the 24/7 front counter for public access. Uxbridge will remain operational, and the future plan is to sell the building

to raise capital and reduce costs, for now CID and Neighbourhood teams continue to be based there until new sites are identified. Maintaining the policing presence in Uxbridge, including the town centre and increasing community contact sessions is ongoing. In the north of the borough, Ruislip Police Station will be kept as an operational base and the Mayor's Office for Policing and Crime will be consulting on the future of its volunteer-led front counter. We are also becoming part of a new west area Basic Command Unit (BCU) joined with Ealing and Hounslow boroughs. Strengthening local policing, as I mentioned, is central to this, and we will be working to develop more efficient and effective ways to increase the police presence, solve crimes and safeguard children and vulnerable people. We will put more updates on our Facebook page and dedicated ward officers will provide updates at ward panel meetings and their regular contact sessions.

Lastly, in March last year we saw an **Colin Wingrove**

increase in burglary offences. We did catch one of the main people responsible and he's now in prison. However, taking a few simple steps to protect your home, flat, shed or business can make a real difference. Checking doors and windows are locked will help you reduce your chances of being burgled. Visit www.met.police.uk/crime-prevention/ residential-burglary for more advice. We also have an award-winning neighbourhood watch scheme in Hillingdon who help prevent crime. Together we can keep Hillingdon a hostile place for criminals and continue to be one of the safest boroughs in London.



NHS Hillingdon CCG spreads the word on how to stay well this winter

Keeping the residents of Hillingdon safe and well this winter is a top priority for NHS Hillingdon Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG).

As part of the healthcare commissioning organisation's winter wellness campaign they will be conducting a series of free public roadshows in the community, offering handy advice and tips to keep people well in the colder months.

If you bump into a member of the campaign team you will be greeted with advice to stay well this winter, and you can also get your pulse rate checked for Atrial Fibrillation (AF). This test will monitor in 30 seconds your

pulse rate that, if found to be irregular, could mean you have the condition. Anyone tested with a high AF will be advised to make an appointment at their GP surgery and will receive information on what to do next.

The roadshows will also offer the opportunity to talk to a member of the team about the CCG's range of free two-hour education workshops. These include how to manage your Type 2 diabetes, adult and childhood asthma, or one of their British Red Cross minor ailments workshops.

Learn new skills, enhance your career prospects or improve your emotional wellbeing

The council offers hundreds of adult learning courses across Hillingdon, and the new year is the perfect time to gain a professional qualification, learn new skills or enjoy a different hobby.

ourses are held at state-of-the-art learning centres and include gardening and floristry, art, languages, maths, childcare, IT, cookery and photography. The adult learning programme is designed for all ages and abilities, but there are also specific courses for over-65s, as well as adults with learning difficulties and disabilities. The council is also running free courses to help people improve their emotional health and wellbeing.

Community projects
The council builds relationships within local communities by offering free courses to help residents improve their skills. Residents attending Austin Road Estate's sewing group in Hayes are

currently learning dressmåking.

Syeda Shah, aged 52 from Hayes, is the community group co-ordinator and a professional dressmaker. She said: "I have a passion for sewing and it's great to see so many women coming along to

the courses to improve

their skills. A lot of people who come here may be out of work or suffering from depression, and the group offers an opportunity to do something positive and meet new people. Some residents speak English as a second language, so our conversations help improve English, and also maths skills as we work with measurements.

"I now make my own clothes and do alterations for other people, so it can also be a stepping stone into work. Our group is so much more than just a sewing club, it's a community hub that gives people confidence. It's such a great feeling when you've created something you didn't know you could."

Emotional health and wellbeing

A range of free wellbeing courses are available to help residents struggling with anxiety, stress, sleep problems or low mood. Classes will encourage people to find ways to de-stress, increase self-esteem, meet new people and find support to improve emotional health.

Aleister Monk, aged 44 from Uxbridge, was working in a demanding retail environment that led him to suffer with stress and anxiety. He enrolled onto a Stress Busting and Boosting Self-Awareness course, where he was given practical learning tools to help find coping strategies and improve his anxiety. He said: "Since taking the course, my selfconfidence has improved and I'm now much more able to control situations that cause me anxiety."

Courses include understanding depression and anxiety, yoga, meditation and relaxation, and empowering parents to improve family life.

Before enrolling on a programme, you will need to have a chat with a wellbeing advisor at any adult learning centre and complete a mood and wellbeing questionnaire. To arrange an appointment, call 01895 556248 or email learntobewell@hae-acl.ac.uk.


