Keep an eye out for it, with its vibrant signage as it continues to make its way around Hillingdon this month.

With summer just around the corner, we will be bringing a whole host of summer events to you. Hayes Carnival returns with its colourful displays and activities in Barra Hall Park. Our Family Fishing Fun Days are also back, offering you and your family a chance to try out this enjoyable pastime. We are working with Hillingdon Arts Association to offer a programme of arts events during June and July, which is new for this year. Hillingdon Arts in Action will include a variety of concerts, arts sessions, theatre and author talks.

Finally, Hillingdon in Bloom was launched in April and you can now apply to take part. I am sure you will agree that it is always a delight to see the colourful displays around the borough during the summer months and I would encourage residents, businesses, schools and community groups to take part.

The two new facilities are the result of successful Chrysalis applications to the council from local residents, and offer a range of equipment, including spacewalkers, rowing machines and bikes. Both have been developed with

young teenagers to adults of all ages in mind and will provide users with a full cardiovascular workout. Signage at the site gives instructions on how to use the equipment and you can even use your phone to scan the QR codes to download video tutorials.

Tony and Rosemary Taylor, who attended the Pole Hill opening and live nearby said that they're planning to use it. Tony said: "We are 76 and I believe it will help me keep on breathing a bit longer!" Rosemary said: "It's nice and close, as it's only a couple of hundred yards up the road."

The council has now installed 18 outdoor gyms

across the borough which offer free access to easy-touse equipment.

Cllr Douglas Mills, Cabinet Member for Community, Commerce and Regeneration, said:

"Since it was established in 2009, the council's Chrysalis Fund has helped deliver more than 170 local projects across Hillingdon to improve its assets. I hope that residents young and old enjoy using the facilities at both parks."

New environment-friendly street lighting to improve visibility

The council has started to upgrade all street light bulbs in council-owned streets across the borough with LED lighting.

The £5.2 million project will benefit residents in terms of security and safety and have a positive effect on the local environment, whilst allowing the council to save money in the long-term.

The work will be carried out over an 18-month period by civil and electrical firm, McCann, who will also maintain all 25,000 street lights,

subways, illuminated signs, bollards and zebra crossings owned by the council boroughwide during the next five years.

Cllr Keith Burrows, **Cabinet Member for** Planning. Transportation and Recycling, said: "Hillingdon is committed to

ensuring that streets are safe for motorists and pedestrians and our latest LED street lighting initiative will see improved visibility and lower running and energy costs."

Remember to have your say on Heathrow

Hillingdon residents are reminded to have their say on the proposals for the expansion of Heathrow Airport before the end of this month.

The 16-week public consultation will close at midnight on Thursday 25 May and the council is continuing to encourage people to respond before this deadline to make sure that local opinions on these devastating proposals are heard.

The proposals have listed the economic benefits of a third runway, yet failed to outline the detrimental environmental impacts that it would bring. The council has listed some of these concerns on www.hillingdon.gov.uk/ *heathrow* and outlined how people have not yet been informed of the airport's new flight paths, which could affect residents boroughwide.

voiced our concerns about the impact of a third runway on the borough. These include an increase in already illegal air pollution levels and more traffic and noise, and the destruction of 1.000 homes with no infrastructure or community facilities planned to support an expanded airport. All of this will be extremely damaging to our environment and will affect residents' health and wellbeing. The council has now responded to the consultation and I encourage residents to also have their say before it ends."

All Hillingdon pupils offered school places

Hillingdon has topped the list in west London for families receiving an offer at one of their preferred primary schools, and the council has once again ensured that every child has been offered a primary or secondary school place for September 2017.

Despite high levels of demand for school places in Hillingdon, 98.5 per cent of applicants received an offer at one of their preferred primary schools in April, and 94.9 per cent of secondary school pupils were also awarded with one of their preferred choices in March.

The council has continued to meet increasing demand for school places by investing more than £314 million into its school expansion programme, one of the largest in London.

said: "Hillingdon Council is proud to offer every child in the borough a primary and secondary school place, and we're delighted that so many families in Hillingdon have been offered one of their preferred school choices.

Academic attainment for children and young people in the borough is very positive, and we will continue to ensure that education is a top priority for the council." Council recovers £100,000 from landlord who illegally converted house

A landlord who converted an Uxbridge house into two flats without planning permission has been ordered to pay £108,000, following legal action by the council.

Mohamed Omar Hassibi, 64, was prosecuted for breaching a planning enforcement notice requiring him to revert his property in Mayfield Close back to a single dwelling.

At a sentencing and confiscation hearing at Isleworth Crown Court in February, Hassibi, who previously pleaded guilty, was fined £1,000 and ordered to pay the council's costs of £7,000.

The court also imposed a confiscation order of £100,000, requiring Hassibi to pay the sum within three months or face going to jail for four months.

The prosecution was brought jointly by the council's planning enforcement team and a trading standards task force that specialises in recovering proceeds of crimes.

Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot,

said: "This is a great result for the council. Hassibi was generating a large rental income - around £2,000 a month from unwitting tenants and it's only right that he should handover the money he earned from his illegal activity. We are committed to ensuring that crime does not pay in Hillingdon."

Mayor hosts afternoon tea for Hillingdon veterans

Four World War Two veterans were invited by the Mayor of Hillingdon, Cllr John Hensley to attend an afternoon tea in March to thank them for their participation in an oral history project.

The Hillingdon veterans, of each of the armed services and now in their 90s, have sat with the council's Local Studies, Archives and Museum Service for a number of sessions to retell their wartime experiences, so that these can be recorded, preserved and archived.

Among the many medals proudly displayed was the highest honour awarded by the French government, the Légion d'Honneur. Myer Malin, (Royal Artillery), Patrick Manion (Royal Navy) and Walter Hart (Royal Army Medical Corps) received the medal for the selfless acts of heroism and determination displayed by all surviving veterans of the Normandy landings and the wider campaigns to liberate France in 1944. Preston (RAF) fought in the Burma campaign.

The Mayor of Hillingdon, said: "I feel like I am walking in the footsteps of giants. I would like to thank them all for taking part

in this project. By recording the veterans' wartime experiences, the council is ensuring that their stories of historical importance are not lost and can be listened to by future generations."

Libraries offer new app to borrow eBooks and **e**Audiobooks

In April, the council introduced a new app for library members to download and borrow eBooks and eAudiobooks as part of a free digital loan scheme.

The BorrowBox library app enables residents to access a varied collection of bestselling authors 24 hours a day, seven days a week from home. You can download books on your smartphone, tablet or home computer and the app also has an inbuilt eBook reader and eAudiobook player.

The list of titles is also expanding constantly to bring you up-to-date content and a range of options to choose from.

To get the app, all you need to do is visit your local library or install BorrowBox on your Apple or Android device. Within the app you need to choose 'Hillingdon Libraries' and enter your library membership

number on your library or Hillingdon First card and the PIN number (the last four digits on your library and Hillingdon First cards).

Be the one... to support them



Foster Care Fortnight (8 to 21 May) is a national awareness raising campaign to encourage more people to foster. We met up with foster carers Lynne and Michael and their former foster child Emma, who told us what it's like to grow up in care.

Lynne and Michael's story

ynne Moore was a childminder when she started fostering with her husband Michael more than 23 years ago when they lived in Ickenham. The couple recently moved to Oxfordshire, but still continue to foster children for Hillingdon Council.

Lynne said: "I'd been childminding for a while when I saw an advert in the paper for fostering. I already had experience with children and I wanted to build on my skills and give something back. Looking after children has always come naturally to me and I just wouldn't do it if it wasn't a rewarding experience. The children may have experienced difficult times, so when they communicate their concerns; we empathise, look for appropriate solutions, and gradually build a relationship. At the end of each day we know we have done our best for the children and that's really fulfilling."

The Moores also have three daughters of their own and Michael believes that it's important to treat each child equally. He said: "Having our own children has always really



helped build trust and confidence with new foster children and we treat everyone the same and offer fair opportunities, consistency is key. Fostering is a personal experience and you have to look at each child

and recognise their strengths; whether it's sport, work ethic or education. We love having an open house and we enjoy the big family environment - we're just a normal

Lynne and Michael feel very proud

of the achievements of the children they have fostered. Lynne says: "Fostering can make such a lifelong difference to a child's life - for life. In fact, it can turn their life around. But we also get a lot out of it too. Michael loves involving the children in sporting activities, socialising around the barbecue and having general discussions. There are also lots of training courses available which have allowed us to learn new skills and grow our knowledge and understanding."

So after 20 years would the Moores encourage others to foster? Lynne concluded: "Fostering can be extremely rewarding and foster carers play a vital role in supporting children and their families. To make a difference you need commitment and enthusiasm, so if anyone has just an inkling about fostering, please try it!"

Emma's story

Emma is 25 years old and she grew up in foster care in Hillingdon with Lynne and Michael Moore. Emma met the Moores when she was just three years old, and first stayed with them temporarily when her family environment became unsuitable.

A year after Emma had returned home, her mother tragically died. Emma reflects: "I was very young when I first met my foster carers Lynne and Michael and because of the violence I had experienced at home, I wasn't able to look Michael in the eye for such a long time. When my mum died I was incredibly fortunate that Lynne and Michael agreed to foster me. They put me into a good school and always made me do my homework, and they taught me the value of education."

couldn't have done it without them

Emma believes that fostering kept her on the right track: "Lynne and Michael were so supportive and I don't know how I would have turned out if it hadn't been for them. I always knew that I wanted to make something of myself but they gave me the help and advice I needed along the way. Most importantly, they never made me feel like I was different and I always felt part of the family."

There are many children in need of



foster carers in Hillingdon, and Emma believes that Lynne and Michael have played an important role in her life. She said: "I was lucky that I had strong values ingrained in me from any early age. Lynne and Michael always pushed for me to do well at school and wanted me to go to university, and they encouraged me to be independent and not rely on others. Their parenting skills and guidance helped me to make sensible decisions and focus on my education."

At 18 years old, Emma moved out into her own flat and studied Business Management at Buckinghamshire University. She is now studying for her Masters degree in HR whilst working part-time, and wants to do a PhD so she can teach. Emma continued: "My foster parents were so proud to watch me graduate and when I got married last year, the whole family came along. I see my foster family a few times a week and we are all very much involved in each others lives."

So why are foster carers so important? Emma concluded: "My foster family had a big impact on my life and I couldn't have done it without them. I've always been ambitious and determined, but Lynne and Michael were always there to steer me in the right direction. New high-tech visitor centre on the way

Building work is well underway at the historic Battle of Britain Bunker site, Uxbridge, where the council is creating a state-of-the-art visitor and education centre.

he council is investing nearly £6 million in the new development adjacent to the historic bunker, where its command centre was instrumental in directing RAF operations during World War Two, particularly in the Battle of Britain (July to September 1940).

The bunker welcomes more than 7,000 visitors on average each year and the council hopes that the centre will enhance the experience at this historic venue for residents and visitors.

The building will be 2,000 square metres in size and set across two levels. The design embraces the central themes of flight and planes with a shell-like form and twisted geometry. There will be a 519 square metre main exhibition hall, which will house a variety of exhibits; 100 seat

auditorium and lecture hall; a café and gift shop; reception area; toilets and a workspace for schools, corporate events and functions. When it opens, visitors will be able to explore the centre and then have a guided tour of the bunker or vice versa.

Work completed at the site so far by construction company VolkerFitzpatrick, has included the demolition of the former building on-site, ground levelling, foundation laying, installation of water, drainage and a steel frame and concrete pouring. The building will be made watertight over the next month, with building completion estimated for late September, when it can then be fitted out, exhibits installed and the landscaping outside finalised.



Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, said: "Work on this new development is really gathering pace. The visitor and education centre will offer both residents and visitors (national and international) the opportunity to learn more about the site's fascinating history and its part in helping to win the Battle of Britain. Hillingdon Council is extremely proud to own the bunker and continue to preserve its history for future generations."

Council launches new mobile library

Hillingdon Council has launched a brand new custom-built mobile library van, which has now started its weekly rounds around the borough.

n Thursday 13 April, Cllr Richard Lewis formally handed over the keys to the van's driver, John Taylor as part of a celebratory launch event on the forecourt of the Civic Centre, marking the beginning of the van's journey in sharing literature with the Hillingdon community.

Cllr Lewis, Cabinet Member for Central Services, Culture and Heritage was joined by children and their families, who took part in a special Easter storytelling and craft making session. Families also had a peek inside and were eager to browse and take out books.

The mobile library will continue to provide a valuable service to residents, particularly those who cannot visit their local library. It stops at 23 roadside sites every week, as well as schools, nurseries, day centres and residential and sheltered homes. The library offers a range of books, free wifi so you can connect to your own device and even hearing aid batteries. There is also a lift for disabled people and the elderly to access the vehicle.

In comparison to the last van, it is more environmentally friendly, efficient and as it is lighter, it can carry more books. It is also the first library in the borough with an iPad computer for borrowing and returning books.

Nathan and Rebecca Asrat, 9 and 11, from Yeading are keen readers and enjoyed exploring the new library van. Nathan said: "It's amazing. I was really excited to see what books there were inside." Rebecca said: "I really enjoy reading fiction and there's lots to choose from here. I like the way the books are displayed it makes you want to pick them up and see what they are about. I want to use the van more in the future."




Gangasuthan (Ganga) Balasubramaniam, 25, Hayes

Cllr Bianco, said: "Hillingdon in Bloom gives local people of all ages the chance to brighten up the borough's green spaces with horticulture, helping to make us the pride of London and beyond. I look forward to touring the borough to see what has been grown this year."

Enhancing biodiversity

Bird boxes

Volunteer gardeners at the RAGC helped to make 36 bird boxes, with support from the Mayor and Mayoress of Hillingdon during National Nest Box Week in February.

The boxes were installed in parks and green spaces boroughwide as part of our entry for this year's Britain in Bloom competition, with the aim of promoting and enhancing biodiversity and conserving birds and wildlife.



Building and installing nesting boxes is important, as natural nest sites for birds, such as holes in trees or old buildings are constantly in decline. There are three types of box, which will aim to attract blue tits, coal tits and tree sparrows.

Wildflower planting

At the end of April, 50 year 3 children from Bishop Winnington Ingram Primary School helped the Deputy Mayor, Cllr Carol Melvin and volunteers to plant wildflowers at Pinn Meadows.

The council has been creating wildflower meadows in open spaces and parks in the borough since 2009 to encourage wildlife and create colourful displays. Planting in our meadows encourages bees, butterflies and other local invertebrates and are in flower until late November.

Wildflower meadows include a mix of native and non-native species, including californian and shirley poppies, red orach, larkspur and cornflowers, are sustainable and low maintenance and produce colourful displays, starting with whites, blues, pinks, turning to reds, oranges and yellows in the autumn.

Belinda Bernadine, Wead Way, Hayes

Flower beds had become unused and the soil heavily compacted. With help from local residents, Belinda organised for the soil to be broken up, fresh compost laid and a range of plants introduced, adding scent, colour and interest for both local wildlife and residents.

Polish War Memorial Garden, South Ruislip

The council transformed an unused piece of land neighbouring the Polish War Memorial into a peaceful memorial garden with a new pond, trees and plants to add interest and diversity.



Ilr Hensley has had an extremely busy year as the Mayor of Hillingdon, which has involved him and his wife representing Hillingdon both within and outside of the borough. The role of mayor is a seven-day a week involvement, often commencing early in the morning and finishing late in the evening.

"My mission statement when elected was to engage with and support the wider community and to help bring about cohesion with the diverse groups that make Hillingdon such a great place to both work and live," he said.

To this end, Cllr Hensley continued in building networks and forging links with residents. "Through my professional career I have been able to meet and get to know so many people across the borough. Also, through this networking I became acutely aware of the pivotal role that organisations and volunteers contribute to the infrastructure of the community, from running youth groups to providing

essential services that we all so readily take for granted," he added.

Cllr Hensley invited these individuals and youth groups to the Mayor's Parlour, where he was able to thank them personally for the work that they do. He said: "I've welcomed more than 400 people of all age groups to the parlour, ranging from seven to 90 years of age." These meetings also gave him the opportunity to explain not only the role of the mayoralty but to share with them his knowledge of local history. These talks have proved so popular that he has been invited to give talks to other interested groups within and outside of the borough. In total, more than 700 people have enjoyed listening to the talks.

In June last year, the Mayor launched his charity appeal at the Hyatt Place Heathrow Hotel, Hayes. In addition, his charity gala evening hosted by the Marriott Hotel and supported by Brunel University, Uxbridge College and Barclays Bank raised £20,000, with performers giving their time for free to support the charities. The community was also at the heart of his annual Civic Service held in February at St Giles' Church, Ickenham and at the Civic Dinner at the Officers' Mess, RAF Northolt in April.

One of his memorable moments was meeting four World War Two veterans on Armed Forces Day in June. He said: "They had so much to tell the young army cadets present that day that it was decided to record their experiences, so that others can appreciate the sacrifices that were made so that we as a community can enjoy and appreciate our freedom and democracy.

"Finally, I'd also like to thank my wife for her support and dedication. This has been an amazing year for her also, where she naturally reaches out to people, talks to everyone and above all values them, as everyone plays a part in making Hillingdon's community what it is"

Young people give back to local projects

During the last five years, the council's youth offending service has facilitated more than 50 projects in the local community with young people as part of its restorative justice approach. We spoke to Hillingdon Narrowboats Association to learn more about how local organisations can benefit from this partnership.



rom making Christmas hampers for the homeless to painting playgrounds at local schools, young people across Hillingdon have been spending their reparation time giving back to the community. Restorative justice focuses on the needs of victims and perpetrators, and offenders are encouraged to take responsibility for their actions and make amends.

Most of the projects involve learning new skills such as carpentry and garden maintenance, and recent ventures have included garden maintenance at local churches, learning to play music with care home residents and a restoration project in partnership with Hillingdon Narrowboats Association.

Last year, young people regenerated the canal lock gates and railings in Harefield. Dave Wright, project manager from the

Hillingdon Narrowboats

Association, worked with the team on the project. He said: "Right from the start, the young people were eager to begin as none of them had done any boating before, and the operation of the lock was a fascinating and unusual way to start the day. Over the next three days, they worked really hard and scraped, sanded, undercoated and glossed all the railings, bollards and lock gates. Everyone was astonished by the

Dave has been really impressed by the young people's dedication and commitment to the project. He concluded: "The young people had a great time. The icing on the cake was when one asked if he could come back again and help with some woodwork, and a couple of others want to come back and volunteer too."

Sanjay Kotecha, Restorative Justice Officer at the council,

works closely with young people whilst they are carrying out their reparation work. He said: "Young people are often hesitant before they start a project, but it's fantastic to watch them develop as they learn new skills and see the difference their efforts will make to the community.

"For those who may have had a difficult start to life, our community projects are a really valuable experience. One young lad we were working with on a school painting project enjoyed it so much that he decided to further his career as a professional painter and decorator, and now owns a successful business."

Sanjay and the team are always on the lookout for future projects for the team to work on and would really encourage local community groups and organisations to get in touch if they have anything the team can help with. Sanjay also noted: "All the materials we work with, such as paints and brushes, are kindly donated to us by local businesses, and we would appreciate any further contributions to support the work the young people do."

Updates from the Borough Commander

At this time of vear, thousands of young people in the borough will be taking their summer exams. GCSEs and A-levels usually grab the

headlines but there are countless SATS, mocks and end of year tests as well, and we wish them all every success. In the new Policing and Crime Plan, keeping children and young people safe is a key priority across London, and this in turn will help them achieve more in school or college. In Hillingdon, this is achieved in varied, sometimes complex ways, and nearly always involves working with another organisation, whether it's the school or council department.

Every day, police officers respond to emergencies and calls that involve children and young people, with the aim of ensuring whatever incident it is, that they deal with it professionally but showing compassion and support when children are involved. Away from the day-to-day calls, we have a team of police officers responsible for working with each of the secondary schools and our Dedicated Ward Officers also have good links with many of the primary schools. As well as being a visible presence outside the secondary schools, they provide input on issues such as personal safety, illegal drugs and knife crime. Recently, I had a great morning at the John Locke Academy seeing how the Junior Citizen programme works. We work closely with the London Fire Brigade, the council and other partners to organise this annual programme, which saw 3,500 year 6 pupils take part in in March this year. The children learnt about water safety, safer travel, stranger danger, health and internet safety. I must

also mention our volunteer police cadets, who recently scooped London awards for the best cadets and cadet staff. The cadets regularly get involved in initiatives to keep Hillingdon safe, as well as numerous activities to develop key personal skills.

With the warmer weather on the way, we know that anti-social behaviour (ASB) and violent crimes tend to increase and we have increased our presence in local ASB hotspots. Dedicated Ward Officers are working with partners to reduce nuisances and also make their area's feel safer. This includes working with the council using Public Space Protection Orders, and enforcement of anti-social street drinking. Our officers have obtained Criminal Behaviour Orders to prevent repeat offenders continuing this behaviour, and Closure Notices to deal with venues associated with drug crime.

All of these measures are there to make local residents feel safer. Our licensing officers are also busy visiting premises, including offlicences, as well as pubs to reduce alcohol-related crime. By working with premises they can help them be safer, more responsible businesses, but if problems continue then we also have to be prepared to take action in order to prevent crime and keep an area safe.

Lastly, over the next couple of months I will be holding some 'Coffee with a Copper' drop-in sessions around the borough so you can let me know how you feel about policing in the borough. More details about this, cadets, and all our other news is on our Facebook page, so keep a look out and in the meantime, visit our new Met Police website, beta.met.police.uk. Type in your street or postcode to access information about your area, your team or get advice.

Home-Start volunteers make a real difference to local families

Home-Start Hillingdon is a local charity that supports families under stress with at least one child under five. They are always looking for new volunteers with parental experience.



I f you have had children or grandchildren yourself, you will remember how difficult those sleepdeprived early years can be. Imagine also being a new mum or dad with no local family support; postnatal depression, twins or multiple births; a diagnosis of autism; or a child with a disability. Home-Start takes referrals for families, who are struggling for any reason, from a range of professionals including health visitors, midwives and children's centres.

Home-Start receives funding from Hillingdon Council and other funders and recruits and trains volunteers who have been parents themselves. Volunteers visit a family in their own

home to give support, befriending and practical help. They help families build up their own support networks and enable them to access the services available to them in their local community. Research has shown that this support significantly increases families' ability to cope.

Kiran's story

"I started volunteering with Home-Start in 2014 and it's been incredible to feel I've made a difference. With my own skills as a parent, plus the training and support provided by Home-Start, I've been able to help four families who were going through difficult times.

From a family

"My volunteer made a difference in my life because I knew I had someone to talk to and it made me feel less isolated. She was always friendly and kind. It has really helped me through a difficult time."

"The things I do as a volunteer can seem simple. I've helped with practical things, talked through strategies to help families cope with everyday life, accompanied them to places to help them get out and

about, provided information about local services and a listening ear, and played with the children. These things can make all the difference to a family who are finding things difficult, and I



feel privileged to believe my support has enabled families to carry on with their everyday lives successfully."

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
